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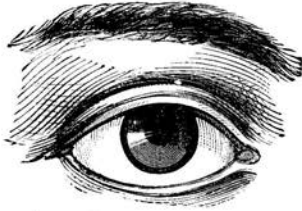

OF THE

Supervisor of Schools.

DISTRICT NO. 1—GEORGE H. SMITH, AGENT.

This school has been under the instruction of Miss Julia I. Bean of Waterboro during its three terms. Miss Bean possesses a great deal of energy, which with her good qualifications, has brought about the success justly due the school. Visited by Fred Benson.

DISTRICT NO. 3—WILL BRADFORD, AGENT.

The school in this district has been under the instruction of Miss Addie B. Holmes of Waterboro, both spring and fall terms. This was Miss Holmes' first school, but she seems to possess the qualities which will bring her success as a teacher. This is one of our small schools but the scholars in attendance made good advancement in all their studies, showing that earnest efforts of their teacher met with the success merited. The order was good. Visited by H. M. Littlefield.

DISTRICT NO. 4—CHARLES CHASE, AGENT.

There has been two terms in this district taught by Miss Rose M. Emery of Waterboro. Visited by H. M. Littlefield.

DISTRICT NO. 5—WILL FOX, AGENT.

Miss Sarah Blake of Limington was employed to teach the spring and fall terms. Owing to the lateness of the class meeting the agent was unable to secure the service of an experienced

teacher. Miss Blake's qualifications were hardly up to the average but the non-success of the school was hardly due to this fact and her failure tends to show the necessity of securing the services, not only of a teacher who is thoroughly qualified, but one also who will strive to set good examples before those under their care.

Winter term now in session under the instruction of Mrs. Belle M. Littlefield. Visited by H. M. Littlefield.

DISTRICT NO. 6—CHAS. W. THOMPSON, AGENT.

Summer and winter terms were taught by Miss Frances M. Hamilton of this town.

On account of sickness the summer term was necessarily short, but all returned at the commencement of the winter term with renewed vigor, and the examination at the close of the term showed that both teacher and scholars had done themselves justice throughout the school year. Visited by F. H. Hobbs.

DISTRICT NO. 7—JOSEPH J. CHADBOURN, AGENT.

This school has been under the care of Miss Georgia Guilford of Hollis during the past year. Miss Guilford shows an earnest desire to do all in her power for the advancement of those under her instruction and the success of her efforts was shown by the written examination at the close of the winter term. Visited by H. M. Littlefield.

DISTRICT NO. 9—BICKFORD CLUFF, AGENT.

This school has been under the instruction of Miss Hattie L. Abbott of this town. Miss Abbott has worked zealously throughout the school year for the school and her efforts were rewarded by success. Visited by Fred Benson.

DISTRICT NO. 10—SIDNEY B. CARLL, AGENT.

This district had three terms the present year, taught by Mr. Fred Benson of this town.

Mr. Benson is an experienced teacher, and the fact that he has taught this school five terms in succession, also having

taught several previous terms, shows the popularity of Mr. Benson in the district, and it is needless to say he met with his usual success. Visited by F. H. Hobbs.

DISTRICT NO. 12—THEODORE BRADEEN, AGENT.

School throughout the year was taught by Mrs. Belle M. Littlefield. Visited the school at the commencement and close of each term.

Mrs. Littlefield is one who not only tries to win the respect, but the love of her pupils, and that she succeeds is plainly shown in her intercourse with them, not only in but out of the school-room. The school made excellent progress under Mrs. Littlefield's instruction. Visited F. H. Hobbs.

DISTRICT NO. 14—A. W. TUCKER, AGENT.

Both terms were taught by Miss Lizzie M. Sawyer of Limerick. This school is composed of small scholars.

Miss Sawyer is one particularly adapted to the care and instruction of small children, always finding something to do, not only teaching them what is found in their text books but giving them oral instruction in many other studies. We consider this district very fortunate in securing Miss Sawyer's services. Visited by F. H. Hobbs.

DISTRICT NO. 16—AMASA VITUM, AGENT.

Summer term was taught by Miss Edlie L. Hamilton of this town.

This was Miss Hamilton's first term, but the success of this, her first attempt, and the advancement made by those under her care, is sufficient for us to predict that she will take her place in the forward ranks of our most successful teachers.

Winter term taught by Mr. Francis M. Bennett of Hollis.

Mr. Bennett is a teacher of broad experience. His ability is unquestionable and the success of this is only a repetition of former terms. Visited by F. H. Hobbs.

REMARKS.

In accordance with custom, we submit our annual school report:

The year has been one showing a fair degree of prosperity for the schools.

A noticeable feature in the schools throughout the town, is, there has been a mutual friendly relation shown between the teacher and scholars, and because of this, good advancement has been made.

There has not been the hearty cooperation between the parents and schools that ought to be to produce the best possible results, for without this interest, no school can gain for itself a high grade of scholarship.

We would recommend that the town avail itself of the privilege of supporting a free high school, the terms to be held alternately in different parts of the town.

By making a small appropriation for this purpose, aided by the state, (the state paying one-half, to the limit of \$250,000), the town can, by proper management, make a long stride towards bringing about a graded system in the largest schools.

The free text book system in town is proving quite satisfactory after a test of three years. The books for the youngest pupils we think will last on an average through a service of three years, and those of older pupils, who can take better care of them, will last much longer. The test shows that we get more uniformity of books, all scholars attending school are better supplied and the books cost the town as a whole much less than under the law prior to August, 1890.

Following is a list of the kinds of text books in use:

Franklin's Readers, Greenleaf's Complete and Primary Arithmetics, Colburn's Mental Arithmetic, Greenleaf's Elementary Algebra, Milne's High School Algebra, Wentworth's Geometry, Kerl's Grammar, Harvey's Grammar Lessons, Waddy's Rhetoric, Swinton's Speller, Harper's Geographies, Meservey's Political Economy, Smith's Physiology, Winslow's Principles of Agriculture, Meservey's Book-keeping.

We would suggest that the town exchange Kerl's grammar for a grammar more modern and practical.

We hope all prejudice regarding the town system, which is to be made obligatory by previous legislation, will be dispelled and the citizens, remembering that the future of our young men and women is built principally in the public schools of our land, will heartily aid the schools under the new management.
