REPORT.

To the Superintending School Committee and to the Citizens of the Town of Waterboro.

"Again the shadow moveth o'er the dial plate of time," and again, by force of the statute, it becomes our duty to give an account of our stewardship to the citizens of Waterboro.

In submitting to parents the report of the annual labor of nearly two hundred scholars, we feel as though we were dealing with matters of no little moment. School labor, unlike all others, will not admit of reconstruction. The mechanic may change the structure of buildings, the engineer may alter the plan of cities, but if the child once learns to read, it is for a lifetime, hence the importance attached to every department of school labor. The education of the young, the children of the poor as well as those of the rich, is the noblest enterprise in which the people of New England are engaged. It is both their glory and strength.

We are gratified to report the general success and prosperity of the schools in town during the past year. Good order has been maintained, generally, parents have indicated a healthy interest in the schools by reason of their frequent visits, the usual good-health of the pupils has continued, and fault-finding has been reduced to a minimum. Notwithstanding these facts, and the fact that school officers and teachers have acted harmoniously to promote the order and efficiency of the schools, the fact remains that the careful observer may frequently note imperfections. It should, also, be stated that many of these spring from sources beyond the control of those in charge of the schools.

Discipline, like Charity, begins at home. The parent that allows the boy and girl to do as they wish, prescribing no bounds, and submitting to indignities rather than correcting them in the wholesome way, has no one but himself or herself to blame if their children meet with disaster at the school in the form of punishment, or are expelled from the school. Nor can it be expected that pupils will be faithful and industrious at school when parents make it a point to sympathize with those children, made to "toe the mark" while attending school. "Order was Heaven's first law," and he who objects to the rule of the school is bound to reap of the whirlwind.

Aside from the trouble in District 10 near the close of the fall term, which was promptly attended to, and the efforts of a misguided individual in another District to destroy the school, our labors have been blessed with harmony. In the latter case, I am pleased to report that I have received the encouragement of every other parent in the District, and with their good help and the assistance of the Truant Officer, we have been able to bring the would-be-wrecker to a realizing sense of the truth of the fact that they who attempt the destruction of the school are treading on unhallowed ground. It is the duty of every citizen to consider their schools as objects of personal interest. As the destiny of the Nation is controlled and wielded by the masses, thus our system of common schools merits the deep and active participation of every individual.

FINANCES.

We have maintained thirty weeks of common school during the year, have increased the average salary paid teachers, and we are gratified to report a good balance on the right side of the ledger.

During the year we have thoroughly repaired and painted the building in District 8, and while it elicited the praise and thanks of the citizens of that District, it was

also a source of pleasure to us to be able to put our oldest schoolhouse in such a condition that it may stand for many years a monument to the many brilliant men and women who received their rudimentary education within its walls.

The building in District 16 has been shingled on both sides, and many repairs made within and without. A flag pole was erected and the flag now floats therefrom during the time the school is in session. Several much needed repairs were made in District 7, a new flag pole was erected before the school building in District 10, and the rope removed from the pole in District 1 by some miscreants was replaced.

Owing to the prohibitive prices of lead and oil, we have attempted to do but little painting during the year. I hoped to be able to report a number of the school buildings whitewashed and painted in this report, but the gentleman who agreed to do the work, apparently, suffered an attack from the hookworm, as he could not be induced to commence operations until it was too late to accomplish much. We have the assurance of another painter that he will be glad to do the work, and the next report should breathe progress in this respect.

At the present time, every school building in use, barring that in District 5, has a good roof and work on the inside can now be commenced with the assurance that its permanency will not be affected by every shower. We are pleased to report a small balance on the right side of the ledger in this department.

Although we have expended eighty dollars less than last year for new books, we yet have a deficiency in this department. When it is considered that our appropriation was but \$50, the reason for this deficiency to many will become apparent. We have exercised strict economy in purchasing books, but book needs must be supplied. We can get along for a time with a leaky roof or an unpainted

building, but the pupil must have his books. A new dictionary that was sorely needed in the High School exhausted nearly one-fourth of our appropriation. Nine-tenths of our citizens understand the facts in this matter, and it is not for their benefit that this explanation is made.

THE REPORT BY DISTRICTS.

District 1. During the entire year, the school in this district has been in charge of Ethel Warren, a former teacher in the district. For several years this has been one of our best schools for the reason that parents and pupils have co-operated with the teachers with this end in view. Recently, petty troubles have arisen and these, with a few troublesome pupils, have combined to impede the usual prosperity of the school. Notwithstanding those disagreeable features, good progress has been made and we are convinced, as well as determined, that the usual high standard will again be in evidence the coming year.

District 4. But one term of school has been maintained in this district, the pupils being transported to District 5 during the fall and winter terms. The spring term was taught by Edith F. Pierce, a graduate of Limerick Academy. The order was good, the deportment excellent, and a most pleasant state of feeling existed between the pupils and teacher.

District 5. Myra B. Durgin, a graduate of our High School, has been in charge of the school during the year, and though this was her first attempt at teaching, kindness and tact and an earnest desire to have her pupils learn, gave to her labors a good measure of progress.

District 7. Florence L. Sargent, of Hiram, a teacher of experience, taught the spring and fall terms in this district. Leora E. Abbott, of Hollis, was employed to teach the winter term but, owing to sickness, was compelled to resign after teaching but one week. Maude L. Kemp, of

Buxton, a teacher of several years' experience was immediately thereafter employed and gave much promise at the first visit of a successful term. The school is yet in session and if good words from parents is a criterion for judgment, the school cannot fail to be highly successful.

District 8. The spring and fall terms in this district were taught by Myra H. Foss, of Hollis. Teacher and scholars manifested a mutual interest, and the progress in the several branches was quite satisfactory. The winter term was taught by Ethel E. Knight, W. H. S., '10. Interest and zeal, on the part of pupils, and energy and faithfulness on the teacher's part, were readily seen. Though this was her first attempt at teaching, she bids fair to become an efficient teacher.

District 9. Estella H. Tarbox, who was employed in the fall of 1909 to bring order out of chaos in this school, was employed to teach the spring term, and repeated her success of former terms. During the summer vacation, she tendered her resignation and Edith F. Pierce was employed to fill the vacancy. We have made mention of Miss Pierce in the report of District 4, but we are bound to say that she apparently makes improvement in every school she teaches, and, in our opinion, is a teacher in whom unbounded confidence may be placed. The scholars appeared deeply interested in their studies, made marked improvement in all branches, and good order pervaded the school.

District 10. The spring term was taught by Elinor A. Chadbourne, a former successful teacher in town. The fall and winter terms were taught by Edith C. Berry, of Bath, Maine, and a graduate of the Morse High School. This is our largest school, and the ordinary teacher will experience difficulty in managing it. A few pupils who, apparently, have never received the proper home training, and for this reason cannot be expected to exhibit the greatest respect for law and order in the school, have made the

teacher's labor much more difficult but, as we remarked in our report of last year, referring to another district, the Reform school may overtake them unless a change of tactics is immediately adopted. Miss Berry labored hard for the success of the school and those who desired to advance made good progress.

District 12. The spring and fall terms in this district were taught by Leora E. Abbott, of Hollis. Miss Abbott succeeded in bringing the school to a high state of discipline and she at all times had the school under perfect control. Thoroughness characterized her work during the two terms and we can, therefore, pronounce each term a complete success.

Miss Lizzie B. Carpenter, a graduate of our High School, taught the winter term, and has continued the high standard set by Miss Abbott. She manifests a great deal of energy in the schoolroom and awakens a lively interest in the minds of her pupils. We noticed she was very thorough in Arithmetic, requiring a reason for every step taken. We also noticed that she appeared to take pride in the appearance of her school room, the stove exhibiting as much labor with blacking and brush, and the windows with soap and water as the good housewife performs in the home.

District 14. The spring and fall terms were taught by Lizzie B. Carpenter, later transferred to District 12. Excellent results were obtained, and nothing but praise was heard for her efforts. As there were too few scholars to make a winter term profitable, they were transported to District 16 during the winter term.

District 15. Mabel E. Thorne taught the spring term in this district. As there are but few scholars in the district; they were transported to District 7 during the fall and winter terms.

District 16. Florence M. Cluff, a teacher of experience, and one of our best scholars, has conducted the three

terms of school in this district. She invariably keeps a good school. She is a very correct scholar, her pronunciation excellent. Her school was well classified, and we believe no better can be found in this vicinity.

No school has been maintained in District 6, and it is quite probable that it will be closed for many years. The abandoned farms are mute evidence of the force that is certainly working havoc to our schools.

WATERBORO HIGH SCHOOL.

The Waterboro High School continues to be an APPROVED school. Since our last report, the school has been twice examined by the State High School Inspector, and that his report of the work being done in the school was satisfactory is evidenced by the Certificate of Approval received just previous to the commencement of the fall term. Mr. Horne has had charge of the school during the past year and has spared no efforts to maintain the high standard set by him during the previous year. He has maintained excellent discipline, possesses the good-will of the pupils to a remarkable degree, and done all in his power to make the school a model of excellence.

A diploma was granted Ethel E. Knight, who had completed the prescribed course, the usual graduating exercises being excused.

Previous to the commencement of the fall term, an examination was held for those desiring to enter the High school, but none appeared qualified to enter the school. While we are at all times desirous of having a large registration in this school, we are opposed to the entry of those not master of the work in the common school.

The schools in Districts 4, 5, 8, 14 and 15 have failed to maintain the average of eight required by Statute, and in order that a school may be maintained in these districts, if deemed profitable by the Committee, affirmative action

on the recommendation of the S. S. Committee must be taken by the town. I trust that this will be done.

CONCLUSION.

At this, my first opportunity, I beg to be allowed to congratulate my townsmen on their decision to reimburse the members of the S. S. Committee for their loss of time while in attendance at Committee meetings. I am sure that my fellow citizens will exhibit the same generosity when dealing with this subject the present year.

I am pleased to again report that the Members of the Committee and the Superintendent of Schools have acted in complete harmony during the year. On all matters coming before the Committee for its judgment, the members thereof have shown by their conclusions a unanimity of opinion rarely found in similarly constituted bodies. They have supplied me with ample authority to properly conduct the schools, and have never halted in their support or encouragement. As I remarked in the report of last year, I now repeat, "if there has been one instance of failure in the management of our schools," charge it to me. On the other hand, for the progress in the schools, for the improved condition of our school-buildings, and for the improved financial condition of our school department, they should receive credit, for the reason that their wise judgment alone made them possible.

An election to the responsible office of Superintendent of Schools of Waterboro is an honor second to none within the gift of the town; a unanimous re-election to the office is a far greater honor. In my humble way I have endeavored to promote the prosperity of the schools, to increase the attendance, to raise the standard. The roll of honor indicates an increased and better average attendance than that of last year, and I am pleased with this one fact alone. The schoolhouse, whose appearance bespeaks

the intelligence of the community, no longer condemns us, and this to me is gratifying. For the confidence placed in me by the members of the members of the committee and by my fellow citizens, I can but express my thanks, and assure them at all times and under every possible condition, they will find in me an ardent champion of their efforts to secure to the youth of Waterboro the benefits that have their fount only in good schools.
