Huditor's Report.

March 1, 1926.

I, Edward E. Libby, Auditor of Waterboro, certify that I have this day made a complete examination of the accounts of Ernest G. Knights, Treasurer, and find receipts of \$46,592.86 and expenditures of 46,556.50 leaving a balance due the town of \$36.36 which he has, as also all vouchers for money paid.

The financial condition of the town shows that the Treasurer has redeemed \$1,000.00 of high school bonds, leaving \$23,500.00 due, and has paid the May Andrews Roberts note for \$700.00. There is no increase in the town's indebtedness except for the East Waterboro school building amounting to \$6,487.31.

I have also made a thorough examination of the accounts of the Selectmen and found them correct.

There is due from the State \$30. for Mothers Aid, and for burial of H. B. Smith and Augusta Hamilton.

Report of the Committee.

East Waterboro School Building.

The Committee named to supervise the construction of a new school building at East Waterboro has performed that duty and now report.

There are, always, in a matter of this nature two elements of great importance to the public. First: Was it needed? Second: Was it economically done?

Happily, the first question is not a matter of dispute for everybody admits that the old building was satisfactory in no way.

We consulted with the State school officials before any work was done regarding the cost of a building of this type and we were informed that the building alone could not be constructed for \$6,500.00. The actual cost of the building, heating plant, toilet systems, insurance for 3 years, and the cost of the lot is less than \$500.00 more than the estimate and it was not supposed that we could do more for \$6,500.00 than to build the bare building. No one dreamed of a cement basement 32x44 nor that we should be able to expend \$150.00 to grade up a frog pond and make an ideal playground for the children. Eliminating this frog pond has increased the value of every lot of land at East Waterboro and the new building will make for a greater increase.

We invite the closest scrutiny of the items making up the cost on the following pages.

One thing remains to be done. Provision should be made at the annual meeting for the erection of a fence inclosing the lot.

SCHOOL REPORT

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of the Town of Waterboro:

I submit, for your consideration, my sixth annual report of the condition and needs of the schools of Waterboro.

We feel that the past year has been one of progress. Generally speaking, attendance has been good, the pupils have maintained a good standard of scholarship, and we note that a spirit of harmony and co-operation prevails.

During the fall term the pupils from Carll's Corner were transported to the school at South Waterboro, the Corner school having been discontinued through failure to maintain an average attendance of eight pupils.

The new building at East Waterboro was completed for occupancy at the beginning of the winter term in January. This is a two-room structure built by a plan furnished by the State Department of Education, and meets all up-to-date requirements in the matter of heating, lighting and ventilation. The rooms are of ample size and very attractive. The building is heated by a hot-air furnace. With its completion we have made one more step in school consolidation. The pupils from Carll's Corner are now transported to East Waterboro. Conveyance facilities, in this instance, have been very

desirable. Much better work has been made possible by the building of this new school; each teacher now has but four grades, the time given to different classes being thus lengthened. In short, we have gained better organization, better discipline, and more efficient instruction.

The grammar room at South Waterboro has been somewhat overcrowded during the past year. The use of the vacant room and the employment of an additional teacher would be an improvement in our system. The discontinuance of the Old Corner school and transportation of those pupils to the village would be beneficial to all concerned.

Very good work is being done in the high school. We note that pupils who have graduated from this school and gone to higher institutions of learning are maintaining a desirable standing. For additional information relative to the high school I would refer you to the report of the Principal.

I wish to commend the work of the Maine Public Health Association for work which it is doing in the matter of school hygiene. The nurse is carrying on activities for which many towns make definite appropriations. I am advised that in the near future the Association will be obliged to employ an additional nurse. Some of the towns in the county are prepared to raise money for medical inspection in the schools, this work to be still carried on by the county nurse as at present. This work is worth while and is worthy of consideration. While the activities of the association

have, in the past, been carried on without cost to the towns, it is felt that with financial aid much more work could be done.

Our buildings are in good state of general repair. Last summer the exterior and interior of the school at North Waterboro were painted, this work being much needed. The building at South Waterboro is in excellent condition. The town has school buildings of which it may well be proud.

A glance at the financial statement will show that the schools have been maintained well within the appropriations. It is very gratifying to have that measure of financial support which permits us to carry on the schools without being cramped for money.

In conclusion, I wish to express to the members of the Superintending School Committee, the teachers and the citizens of the town, my appreciation of their loyalty and support during the past year.

REPORT OF HIGH SCHOOL

To the Superintendent of the Waterboro Schools:

I herewith submit to you, and through you, to the School Committee and people of this town, my report of Waterboro High School.

The high school began the year with an enrollment of forty. A few have left school since the beginning of the year, but due to some late entrants, the enrollment has remained about the same.

I was pleased to find a laboratory well equipped for the study of Chemistry, and in this respect we are very fortunate, for in this era of high prices a new supply of chemicals would be very expensive. Some new apparatus will be needed next year for laboratory work in Physics, as the present supply is inadequate for the proper study of that subject.

As in most high schools, the quality of scholarship is variable. Some show an appreciative and praiseworthy interest in their work, and apply themselves to their subjects in a way that can not but insure good results. But others, as usual, are content with merely a passing grade. I want to urge upon the parents—with all emphasis—the absolute necessity for home work. Those parents who allow their children to neglect home study are doing an injustice to their children, as well as to the school. Nine-tenths of the failures in school are due to neglect of home study.

I feel that a word should be said in commendation of
