A Glimpse of Its Past

History having been defined as "the record of what man has done," it is both interesting and timely to look into that record that we may see what he has done here in this section of the Pine Tree State in which our fathers carved homes for themselves out of the wilderness. In this year of 1937—a century and a half since the incorporation of our town in 1787—it is fitting that we pause for a glimpse of its past, the better to appraise its future.

Let us go back of 1787—back to the middle of the 17th century, to the year 1661 to be exact, in order that we may get the true background of Waterboro. In 1661 Major William Phillips of Saco bought a large tract of land from three Indian chiefs—Fluellen, Hobinowell, and Captain Sunday. In this deal these sagamores sold to Phillips the area which is now contained within the townships of Sanford, Alfred, Waterboro, that part of Limington south of the Little Ossipee River and the portion of Hollis north of Salmon Falls on the Saco. After the death of Major Phillips and the subsequent passing of his widow, the territory contained within the Town of Waterboro came into the possession of three Boston proprietors—this by virtue of a will of Mrs. Phillips—and the town was named for one of them, Col. Joshua Waters.

The town was surveyed in 1784-5 and the plan, made by James Warren, is now held in the county records at Alfred. A boundary settlement with the Town of Hollis was not reached, however, until some twenty years later. The Little Ossipee River bounds the town on the north—Limerick and Limington coming to the opposite shores; Limington and Hollis bound the town on the east, with Lyman and Alfred forming the southerly boundary, while Alfred, Shapleigh, and Newfield bound the town on the west. The town contains about forty square miles of which from two to three square miles are covered by water. The largest body of water is Little Ossipee Lake which is some three and one-half miles long.

In 1768 we find that John Smith settled near Waterboro Old Corner and during the next two years some eight families settled in this locality or nearby. The population of the settlement grew slowly owing to the outbreak of the Revolutionary War, and at the end of fifteen years there were fewer than one hundred twenty-five people in the community, which was then known as "Massabesic Plantation."

There were at this time two principal roads, if roads we may call them as they may well have been little more than glorified trails. One of these roads led along the westerly shore of Massabesic Pond, on through the Old Corner and across the easterly spur of Ossipee Mountain to the southerly end of Little Ossipee Lake. From this point the road led through North Waterboro and crossed the Little Ossipee River at a ford not far above where the bridge is now located. The other road branched at the Old Corner and, following a course to the east of Middle Branch and Poverty Ponds, led down the outlet of the latter to a point about a mile from the Little Ossipee River and thence to Dam's Mills.

In 1780 Samuel Dam came from Durham, New Hampshire, and opened a public house about a mile south of the Old Corner. Later, Mr. Dam, being an industrious man, bought the mill site on the Little Ossipee River in Newfield, built a saw mill and a grist mill there, sent his son to manage the business, and the family gave its name to the community—Dam's Mills.

In 1790 the General Sessions Court was moved to Waterboro and a courthouse was built where the road forked about a mile south of the Old Corner. In 1805 the court was moved to Alfred and the building sold.

The first church, a union church, was organized in 1782, its meetings being held in Joshua Ricker's home. The members of this church were later divided among the various parishes as they were organized. The next church, formed in 1791, was a Baptist church at the Old Corner. A meeting house was built in 1794 and the Rev. Henry Smith became the first regular pastor, serving his congregation for more than two score years. The church building was rebuilt about 1804 and remodeled, first in 1850 and again in 1890. It stands today, a stately building beautifully situated on the hillside flanked by its row of shade trees.

With the passing years and the growth and spread of the population other church societies were organized. The churches in the southerly, easterly, northerly, and central sections of the town, the one on Ossipee Mountain and the Elder Gray meeting house on Bradeen's Ridge filled the need of their respective communities. In connection with the Elder Gray meeting house it is interesting to recall that one hundred five years ago it was moved with oxen from its site near Chadbourne's Mills at the northerly end of Little Ossipee Lake to its present location on the Ridge.

In 1784 the first school was opened in the town. This

school, a private school, was held in a barn and was taught by Samuel Robinson. In 1789 free instruction was offered by the town and from that time to the present day the boys and girls of Waterboro have had their opportunity to "study and prepare themselves." Prior to 1819, when Col. Samuel Bradeen and the Rev. Henry Hobbs, as representatives of the Town of Waterboro, voted in the Portland Convention for the separation of Maine from Massachusetts, the three R's were the subjects taught. After Maine became a separate state, grammar and geography were added to the course of study—other subjects being added as the need became evident.

The desire of parents that the young people should have an opportunity to pursue those subjects usually taught in secondary schools led the citizens to decide to open a free high school. For many years the sessions of the high school were held in the Town Hall at Center Waterboro but in 1922 a modern high school building was opened in South Waterboro. This building is a credit to the town, providing grade housing accommodations as well as high school quarters. All schools in town were graded some over twenty years ago and have for many years been in charge of a union superintendent of schools.

It would seem needless to say that our schools have given early training to many who have gone out into the world and made a success in their chosen work—in the ministry, the law, medicine, business, and in all those many kinds of endeavor in which conscientious and industrious people engage. Others of our youth have remained at home—to work on the farm and in the woods, to work in the local stores, saw mills, and in the industries in nearby towns. They are the ones charged with the duty of protecting our heritage from the past and transmitting it, enriched by their own contribution, to the future.

Although no names are given, tribute is paid to all those who, by their lives, have reflected credit upon the town of their birth. Although no roster appears, grateful appreciation is accorded to those who have served well our town and country in the wars in which our nation has engaged in the last century and more. With this salute to those who have contributed to the welfare and good name of Waterboro it is sufficient to say that this brief outline of its history is presented in the hope that those interested will feel the urge to explore further a subject deserving the attention of every citizen of our town.

AUDITOR'S REPORT

I, Horace P. McLaughlin, appointed Auditor to succeed Raymond H. Bradeen resigned, hereby submit my report as Auditor for the year 1937.

I have made a most thorough examination of the accounts of the Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor and hereby declare that the same have been correctly kept and balanced.

I have also carefully examined the books and accounts of the Treasurer and Collector of taxes for the year 1937. He has exhibited to me evidences of payment on proper warrants amounting to the sums set forth in his "CREDIT" account as such Treasurer to the last cent.

I have given the same examination to his books as Collector and certify the attached report is correct.

I have checked all tax sales and lien claims of the town in his possession and find the town owns real estate tax claims of the amount of \$780.75 and owns properly recorded tax liens amounting to \$1,574.66. I was unable to find anything of this nature prior to 1934. It should be called to the attention of delinquent taxpayers that tax liens, unless redeemed within eighteen months after filing, transfers the title of such property to the town. I find that the debt of the town has been reduced exactly \$5000.00 during the year. The Treasurer has cash \$3,174.04.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Superintending School Committee and citizens of Waterboro:

I submit herewith for your consideration the annual report of the Waterboro schools.

Pupils are registered and classified in the elementary schools at present as follows:

Number of persons between the ages of 5 and 21 years according to last school census: 133 boys; 148 Girls; Total 281.

There has been but one change in the teaching personnel during the past year. Mr. Leslie Ross resigned the South Waterboro Grammar School position to accept a position in Biddeford. Mr. Howard Libby of Newfield was elected to fill the vacancy thus caused.

During the past summer the school at South Waterboro was painted inside. This is the first time there has been

any interior decorating since the school was built. Owing to extensive repairs that were necessary to put the walls in proper condition for this work, the appropriation was overdrawn and there is still unpaid the sum of one hundred dollars.

Something very definite should be done during the coming year relative to the heating problem at East Waterboro. The furnace in that building is temporarily repaired but before another winter a more efficient system should be installed. The present system has never been satisfactory and money spent to repair it is wasted.

Standards set by automobile liability insurance companies indicate the fact that improvement in the type of school conveyance busses is imperative. Since the law requires that all such busses be insured and the insurance companies make certain requirements and regulations there is no alternative in the matter except to meet these standards.

It appears that under Chapter 91, Public Laws of Maine 1935, the Town of Buxton may have to reimburse the Town of Waterboro for extra expense of transportation of the Cressey children at North Waterboro. Bills for this extra expense aggregating \$964.10 have been presented to the Town of Buxton. A suit between the Town of Turner and the City of Lewiston based on this Chapter 91 of the Laws of 1935 is now pending in the court. The decision in that case may assist in making clear the application of this particular law to our problem in this extra expense for the transportation of the Cressey children.

In conclusion I wish to express to the committee to the teachers and to the citizens of Waterboro my appreciation of the kindness and consideration shown me during the past year.

Three students have left Waterboro High School. A Sophomore boy because of injuries received in a hunting accident, and two Freshmen; a girl who transferred to Alfred, and a boy who went to work. The average attendance is 42.05 pupils.

I would suggest a study of the curriculum in view of reorganizing it in order to care more fully for the needs of the large majority of students who do not plan, or are not able, to continue their formal education after high school.

I again recommend the addition of a music course to our school system in order that we may give our students an appreciation of that worthy art, and allow them to take their place with other schools of the County in the annual musical entertainment given at the County Teachers Organization.

I wish to express my sincere appreciation to all who have helped contribute to the success of the past five years.

- Fourth: To see what sum the town will grant and raise for state aid road construction (in addition to the amount regularly raised) for the care of ways, highways and bridges under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of Section 3, Chapter 229, Public Laws of 1937.
- Fifth: To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for winter roads.
- Sixth: To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for State Road Patrol.
- Seventh: To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the support of a Free High School for the year ensuing.
- Eighth: To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the support of Common Schools for the year ensuing.
- Ninth: To see what sum of money the town will grant and

- Ninth: To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for Text Books and Supplies for the year ensuing.
- Tenth: To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the Repair of school buildings for the year ensuing.
- Eleventh: To see what sum the town will grant and raise for salary for the District Superintendent for the year ensuing.
- Twelfth: To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for Public Health Nurse for the year ensuing.
- Thirteenth: To see what sum the town will grant and raise for the Support of Poor for the year ensuing.
- Fourteenth: To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for Incidentals for the year ensuing.
- Fifteenth: To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for State Tax for the year ensuing.
- Sixteenth: To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for County Tax for the year ensuing.
- Seventeenth: To see what sum the town will grant and raise for 50-50 Road Machine work for the year ensuing.
- Eighteenth: To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for Principal and Interest on Town Bonds for year ensuing.
- Nineteenth: To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the Observance of Memorial Day for the year ensuing.
- Nineteenth: To see what action the town will grant and raise for Interest on tax anticipation notes for the year ensuing.
- Twentieth: To see what action the town will take with reference to the town farm for the ensuing year.

Twenty-first: To see if the town will vote that, for the purpose of procuring a temporary loan or loans, for the use of the town of Waterboro to pay indebtedness of said town due, and to become due during the municipal year 1938, such loans to be paid out of money raised by taxation during the municipal year beginning March 15, 1938 and ending March 15, 1939, the Town Treasurer be, and he here by is authorized and directed to borrow from time to time a sum, not exceeding in the aggregate Fourteen thousand dollars, said sum being less than the tax levy for the year 1937, and to execute and deliver a note or notes of the town therefor, signed in his official capacity as Treasurer, countersigned by the Selectmen, all of said notes, or any renewal or replacement thereof shall be payable on or before December 31, 1938.

Twenty-second: To see if the town will authorize the Collector to charge interest on all unpaid taxes at the rate of one-half per cent per month upon all taxes unpaid October 1, 1938, interest to begin Sept. 1, 1938.

Twenty-third: To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the cutting of bushes on improved roads during the municipal year 1938 and see what method the town will adopt in the cutting of the same.

Twenty-fourth: To see what sum, if any, the town will grant and raise for the cutting of bushes on unimproved roads in said town for the year 1938 and if so to see what method the town will adopt for the cutting of the same.

Twenty-fifth: To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the extermination of brown tail moths for the year ensuing.

Twenty-sixth: To see what sum of money the town will grant

and raise for the maintenance of third-class roads for the ensuing year.

Twenty-seventh: To see what action the town will take regarding the recommendations contained in the report of the Finance Committee relating to abatement of delinquent taxes of taxpayers in the town of Waterboro.

Twenty-eighth: To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to set aside the sum of \$150.00 from the appropriation for Incidental expenses, this sum, together with a like amount to be raised by the Ossipee Lake Community Association, to be paid not later than July 1st to the Cumberland County Power and Light Company in consideration of an agreement on their part to refrain from drawing water from Little Ossipee Lake prior to Sept. 15, 1938.

Twenty ninth: To see what sum of money if any, the town will grant and raise for the repair of the way from E. S. Carll's store to the residence of Herbert May. Petition of Herbert May Jr., and others.

Thirtieth: To see if the town will grant and raise \$100.00 for the improvement of road leading from Route No. 4 to, and past, the residence of Benjamin P. Hamilton on petition of Edith J. Roberts and others.

Thirty-first: To see if the town will grant and raise a sum of money for the repair of Pearl street for the year ensuing, and if so, how much, Amy G. Erackett, and others, having requested an appropriation of \$200.00.

Thirty second: To see if the town will grant and raise a sum of money to restore the street lights to the town.

Thirty-third: To see if the town will grant and raise a sum of money to aid the Waterboro Fire Department in buying needed equipment and, if so, how much. Petition of E. S. Carll and others.

- Thirty-fourth: To see if the town will give every man and truck equal chance to work on State and town road within the town of Waterboro, on petition of C. T. Ricker and 65 others.
- Thirty-fifth: To see whether the town will vote to expend the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars for the repair of that portion of the town road which lies between the Red school house, so-called near the residence of Mrs. Inez Thing and the fork in said road near the residence of Mr. Richard Carpenter.
- Thirty-fifth: To see if the town will vote to raise and expend the sum of fifty dollars for the improvement of roads in Johnson Park so-called.
- Thirty-sixth: To see if the voters of the town will ratify the agreement heretofore made by the Selectmen of Waterboro conditioning for the future care and support of Orrin C. Boothby.
- Thirty-seventh: If said agreement be ratified, to see what sum the town will grant and raise for his care and support during the current year.
- Thirty-eighth: To see if the town will vote to authorize its Finance Committee on behalf of the town to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by the town for non-payment of taxes thereon, on such terms as they deem advisable, and to execute quitclaim deeds for such property.
- Thirty-ninth: To transact any other business that may be legally brought before said meeting.

The Selectmen hereby give public notice that they will be in session at the town house at 9 o'clock of the morning of the annual town meeting for the correction of the list of polls of those entitled to vote in municipal affairs.
