Report of the Superintendent of Schools

To the Citizens and the Superintending School
Committee:

I herewith submit for your consideration the annual report of the schools of Waterboro.

The school census lists 150 boys and 125 girls between the ages of five and twenty-one. One hundred sixty-five of these are registered in the elementary schools of the town as follows: Waterboro Village Grammar, 42; Intermediate, 29; Primary, 35; East Waterboro Intermediate, 21; Primary, 22; North Waterboro, 16.

During the summer Mr. Sewall M. Drisko resigned as principal of Waterboro High School. He had been with us for ten years and it was with regret we saw him go. We were fortunate in securing the services of Mr. Stanley M. Libby to take Mr. Drisko's place.

Although many schools throughout the country have remained closed during the first half of the school year, Waterboro has been able to maintain its full quota of teaching positions, filling them with trained and experienced teachers. Some 200,000 teachers have left the profession since Pearl Harbor. They have been drawn into military service or have accepted the higher wages paid by the necessary war industries. Thousands of others see their students leaving high

school and making better wages than teachers of long experience. Be it said to the credit of the teaching profession, however, they do not deplore the advances made by other groups.

The citizens of Waterboro met in special town meeting in December and voted an increase in teacher salaries. This, I am sure, was much appreciated by the teachers.

Only minor repairs on the school buildings have been necessary this year. This accounts for a considerable balance in the repairs account.

The school is a great wealth-producing agency, both materially and spiritually. It develops and furnishes with power and purpose the instrument for creating wealth—the human mind.

May I in closing quote from the Maine State School Bulletin a paragraph printed by permission of the National Education Association: "Teaching is a great trusteeship—the debt eternal of each generation to the new life which must take its place. As surely as children grow, the schools must go on. Education cannot wait. The neglect of growing youth cannot be repaired. The war intensifies the need for good teachers. Victories in war and peace are won not by machines, but by men—men of purpose, skill, initiative, and courage. Men mine the ore, make the steel, fashion the weapons, fly the planes, negotiate the treaties, keep or break the peace, build the future."

I wish to thank all who have helped in any way to make the year more profitable.

During the year two Freshman boys left school to go to work.

The work of the school has gone along very well

for the year. I have found the pupils quite co-operative.

With restrictions on gasoline reduced this year, we have made a start to return to the extra-curricula activities. The school participated in the Central York County League Spelling Contest, where one of our pupils, Miss Elizabeth Holmes, won the fifth place medal. We have also revived basketball and arranged a short schedule for both boys and girls.

In looking to the future, I would like to recommend for your consideration, the purchase of visual education equipment. Such equipment would be a great asset to your school, and would assist greatly in the teaching process. With the availability of so many films produced by the large corporations and government agencies, there is a ready supply of worth while pictures at little or no cost. That which is recorded on the human mind is retained much longer than that recorded by the ear.

I would also like to recommend the installation of some type of bottled gas for the laboratory. Our present system of alcohol burners does not provide the desired heat for laboratory work.

In closing, I would like to thank all those who have aided in making this year a happy and successful occasion.

REPORT OF PUBLIC HEALTH NURSE

To the Citizens of the Town of Waterboro, I hereby submit the annual report for the year 1943.

During January, February and March, 83 children and five adults were vaccinated against smallpox, 36 pupils and teachers were given the Tuberculin Patch Tests. All positive reactors to the Tuberculin Tests were taken to the State Diagnostic Clinic and chests X-rayed. Several follow-up calls were made to homes of tuberculous suspects and positive reactors.

In April a motion picture film on Tuberculosis was shown to 110 High School and Junior High School students.

By request of teachers and parents several special school inspections were made for evidence of skin disease and pediculosis. Also many other home calls were made during the year to urge or aid in securing corrections for the school children.

REPORT OF THE
SUPERVISOR OF MUSIC

I herewith submit my annual report of music in the schools.

I wish it were possible for me to give a complete account of the musical activities of every school in town, but time and space allow only a brief reference to each.

Starting from our farthest point, North, has five grades with mostly younger children this year. It is difficult to adjust a program suited to so many ages but they are all very responsive and are singing well; also getting some theory.

Miss Hamilton's class covering the first three grades, at East, have improved in tone production and several monotonies of last year are now singing on pitch when with the choir group.

Miss Roberts' room, grades four, five and six, at East are getting on well in tone and theory. All are conscientious workers and enjoy singing.

Mrs. Hobbs, grades one, two and three, at South, has an unusually musical class this year and they are accomplishing excellent results in all their work.

Miss Carpenter's grade four, five and six, are now showing the effects of three years of music instruction and seem to have a good grasp of time, tone and theory,

according to their grades.

Mrs. Fields continues her good work in grades seven and eight. They have new song books this year which they enjoy.

All grades were represented in the presentation of a little operetta, "Uncle Sam's Christmas," the parts of which were well taken and gave evidence of hard work by both teachers and pupils.

The high school has some unusually good voices this year and a Christmas Cantata was started, but the music scores were so delayed in the mails it could not be completed in season.

Our new principal, Mr. Libby, is much interested in music and has had experience in band and orchestra work. We hope it may be possible to undertake something in this line later on.

Charles Heffernan kindly loaned an album of fine symphony recordings for a brief music appreciation period recently.

A current Music Magazine article features the training men are receiving in the Army along musical lines, instrumental and vocal. The writer says: "The Army of Uncle Sam turns to music for rest, and it is a never failing recreation from the hardships and monotony of service conditions. The Army believes a singing soldier is a fighting soldier."

I believe music makes for better citizenship as well.

May I here express my appreciation to Mrs. Hobbs and Miss Abbott for their work as accompanists in the schools of South and East.

Also, to the Superintendent and School Board and all the teachers who have assisted in making this a very satisfactory year in my work.

As Administrator of the estate of the late Mary Thompson, I was able to turn over to the town after the approval of my final account the sum of \$1,708.60 (Receipt No. 829). In addition to this sum, there was an impounded account in the Fidelity Trust Company of Portland, Maine, amounting to \$326.57. A dividend on this amount was paid December 1, last, and that was turned over to the town, amounting to \$108.86 (Receipt No. 849), and leaving a balance due of \$217.71. It will be remembered that on February 1, 1939, we received \$1,000.00 on this account, which was for the care and maintenance of Mary Thompson for several years.

For the twenty-first time, I am privileged to present my report as Treasurer and Collector of Taxes for the Town of Waterboro, for the approval of the citizens of the town, and subject to the audit of the State Department of Audit. I thank the voters for their long and loyal support, regardless of political ties, and they, themselves, are the best judge of the character of my work during these many years.

The work of the office has greatly increased because of the tax withholding law, for the reason that another set of records must at all times be kept.

I am pleased to report that the financial condition of the town remains excellent, that we have no outstanding debts except the bonded indebtedness, which commenced with the amount of \$29,000.00 November 1, 1936 and has been annually reduced so that today but \$15,000.00 of this amount remains unpaid. We have been able to meet interest and principal payments on, or before, they were due with the result that the credit of the town is of a very high order.

Eighth: To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for Text Books and Supplies for the year ensuing.

Ninth: To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the Repair of School Buildings for the year ensuing.

Tenth: To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the Salary of the District Superintendent for the year ensuing.

Eleventh: To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for Public Health Nurse for the year ensuing.

Twelfth: To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the support of Poor for the year ensuing.

Thirteenth: To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for Incidentals for the year ensuing.

Fourteenth: To see what sum of money the town

will grant and raise for State Tax for the ensuing year.

Fifteenth: To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for County Tax for the year ensuing.

Sixteenth: To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for 50-50 Road Machine Work for the year ensuing.

Seventeenth: To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for Interest on Town Bonds for the year ensuing 1944.

Eighteenth: To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the retirement of two Town Bonds for the year 1944.

Nineteenth: To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for Observance of Memorial Day for the year 1944.

Twentieth: To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for Interest on Tax Anticipation Notes for the year ensuing.

Twenty-first: To see what action the town will take regarding the town farm for the year ensuing.

Twenty-second: To see if the town will vote to grant authority to the Selectmen and Treasurer to borrow money on the credit of said town to pay current bills, now due or to become due during the fiscal year

of 1944 and to sign notes of said town for the repayment thereof prior to March 1, 1945.

Twenty-sixth: To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the Maintenance of Third Class Roads for the year 1944.

Twenty-seventh: To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the continuation of the present street lighting system.

Twenty-eighth: To see if the town will instruct the Selectmen to cause Warrants to be issued against all persons who fail to pay their dog taxes prior to May 15, 1944, after giving such delinquents ten days' notice that complaints would be made under the provisions of Section 161, Chapter 5, of the Laws of the State of Maine.
