Report of the Superintendent of Schools

To the Citizens and the Superintending School Committee:

I herewith submit the annual report of the school of Waterboro:

Elementary registration is 158. South Waterboro registers by grades as follows: Grades 7-8, 34; Grades 4, 5, 6, 28; Grades 2-3, 28; Sub-Primary and Grade 1, 19. At East Waterboro there are 20 in the primary school and 21 in the intermediate. North Waterboro primary has 8.

There has been no change in the personnel of regular classroom teachers during the year. However, Mrs. Helen Dolley, after several years of service as supervisor of music, retired from teaching during the fall term. Thus far we have been unable to fill this position. It is our hope that some time in the near future this town uniting with two or three neighboring towns will be able to secure some one to carry on this very worthwhile subject. This matter should be kept in mind in considering the school budget for the coming year.

There are two bills before the present legislature relating to increase in teachers' salaries. One proposes a yearly minimum salary of \$1,500. The other provides for a salary range from \$1,000 to \$2,000 based on the number of years of training a teacher has had. In an-

ticipation of the passage of one of these bills, it will be necessary for the town to be prepared to meet this

The teacher shortage is still critical and there does not seem to be any immediate relief in view. Without adequate salary adjustments, conditions will doubtless become worse.

Some improvements and repairs of buildings have been made during the year. A new smoke pipe was installed on the boiler at the South Waterboro building. Heating facilities in the High School assembly room have been improved by the addition of radiation and by weather stripping the windows. During the summer new cement steps were built at East Waterboro. Provision has been made for preparing and serving hot lunches both at South and East and a very good lunch program is being carried on through the efforts of interested citizens. Much commendation is due the women who have sponsored and carried on this work.

I wish to express my appreciation to the teachers, the committee, and all those who have so helpfully cooperated during the year.

I would like to suggest at this time for consideracion the construction of some suitable bulding for our school extra-curricula activities. There is a great need for such a building in this town. I hope some study will be made of the situation and something done to improve the present conditions.

With the retirement of Mrs. Helen Dolley last fall, there has been no music taught in our schools this year. Some effort should be made to return this work to the schools. I believe that we should have an instructor who can teach, not only vocal music, but also, instrumental music. There is at present practically no instrumental music being taught to the boys and girls of this town. I feel very deeply that the organization of a band or orchestra, under a capable teacher should be given very thoughtful consideration.

REPORT OF THE MAINE PUBLIC HEALTH NURSE

I herein submit a brief report of service rendered the town of Waterboro by the York County Tuberculosis and Health Association for the period January 1, 1946 to December 31, 1946.

Early in the year, 73 students were given Tuberculin tests, four positive reactors found and X-rayed at the State Diagnostic Clinic held in Sanford. Also two previous reactors were re-X-rayed. All positive reactors are followed up by the nurse. They often lead to unknown cases of active Tuberculosis that were the source of infection. Active disease found early is quickly cured. The education of pupils and parents as to the importance of this disease and the methods of prevention, detection and cure is extremely valuable to the individual welfare of both children and adults and protection of public health. No TB case finding program in the schools would be complete without including all school personnel. Extensive work in case finding is now in progress. Movie films on Tuberculosis and Cancer were shown in the South Waterboro school. Booklets and pamphlets on TB and Good Health practices have been furnished the schools.

Eighty-six audiometer tests were given to students in High School and grades 5, 6, 7, and 8. Eight were found with defective hearing and recommendations for corrections offered.

Immunization clinic was organized for all children

in town from 6 months to 18 years of age. Three clinics were held in the South Waterboro School.

- 46 children were given Small pox vaccinations
- 43 children were given Diphtheria Toxoid
- 9 children were given Whooping Cough vaccine 8 children were given Perdipigen (Whooping cough and diphtheria combined)

Immunizing was done by Dr. Carl Richards of Alfred.

TREASURER'S STATEMENT

Because of the confidence of my many friends in this town of Waterboro, which I assure one and all is most highly appreciated, I am privileged to present my twenty-fourth annual report as Treasurer and Collector of Taxes.

This report has been closely checked, is believed to present our financial set-up to a cent, and will be subjected to the annual audit of the State Department of Audit

It will be noticed that our cash balance is less than \$25.00, but there is one outstanding note at the Springvale National Bank in the amount of \$2,500.00 that could not be paid for the reason that there is an increase in our delinquent taxes for the year and it was necessary to incur overdrafts in some departments, as will appear in the report of the Selectmen. It should be stated here that our snow removal and sanding operations are increasing from year to year and it is not humanly possible to estimate with anywhere near exactness the amounts that should be appropriated from year to year. For example, the amount recommended for snow removal last March for 1946 has been practically spent for the same purpose during the winter of 1945-1946. The timber cutting that has taken place in town during the past five years leaves us with a decreased total valuation, and tax rates like that of the current year, or 76 mills, is the inevitable result.

TOWN OF WATERBORO

We have our bonded indebtedness reduced to the amount of \$9,000.00. It will be remembered that it was \$29,000.00 on March 1, 1938. We have made every annual payment and every semi-annual interest payment during this period on the due dates. The credit of the town is of the best and we have no difficulty in negotiating necessary loans, and at very low rates.

The Caroline Leonard Funds remain, in amounts, exactly as last year, with the exception that one year's interest is to be added.

Account 23285-for care of graves at Waterboro Center \$ 354.36

Account 22913-for church, schools and poor, Old Corner \$ 195.35

Account 22912—for church, schools and poor, Waterboro Center

Of the \$4,271.74 represented as delinquents, it is my opinion that approximately 75 per cent will be paid during the next four months.

It is not necessary to state that the receipt and disbursement of more than \$71,000.00, as has been the case this year, involves much labor, much bookkeeping and much care. Twenty-four years' work in this office would seem to be an impossibility. I am not after an endurance record but, for the first time, I must say that I am hopeful that in the very near future, there will be such a number of candidacies for this office, or offices, that I can drop gracefully from the picture.

Meanwhile, let me assure my many loyal friends in Waterboro that I greatly appreciate their confidence and good will and that I shall never forget the countless efforts of theirs to place me in positions of responsibility and trust. Thank you all, again.

COMMENTS

Re: Audit of Accounts—Town of Waterboro February 22, 1945 to February 20, 1946

Cash-General

A detailed examination was made of all receipts and disbursements for the 1945 fiscal year. As the bank statements were not reconciled and no check book balance ever taken, it was necessary to compare each check with the warrant items.

It is the usual practice for the Treasurer to allow each year's bank account to remain open until practically all checks have been cashed and then transfer the remaining balance to the current year's account. As the 1945 account was not closed until May 16, 1946, and deposits were made in March and April, it was apparent that considerable cash was on hand at the close of the fiscal year. For this reason, an examination was made of 1946 receipts, deposits, and cash on hand to the date of this audit, October 21, 1946, which examination disclosed a difference of \$325.90 representing the deductions for Teachers' Pensions and Teachers' Retirement withheld from payroll checks from the opening of school in September, 1945, to the close of the fiscal year. The Treasurer did not take these funds into consideration in depositing monies to balance the 1945 cash. If all town money was maintained separate from other funds and deposited regularly to take care of Treasurer's receipts as drawn, no differences would

Accounts Receivable

This account represents monies expended on roads and is to be reimbursed by the State of Maine.

Taxes Receivable

After adjustment of minor errors, the 1945 tax commitment was found to be in agreement with the records of the Assessors and was properly signed.

The outstanding taxes for 1945 were listed from the records of the Collector. These taxes, properly authorized abatements and cash payments to the Treasurer accounted for the total commitment.

Approximately \$875 was collected during the year on prior years' taxes.

Tax Liens

Payments recorded as received during the year on tax liens appeared to have been applied against the proper items. The liens remaining unpaid were found on file with the Treasurer and were checked in detail.

Accounts Payable

In adding the 1945 excise tax receipts, No. 1 to 406 inclusive, two errors were noted, an overpayment of \$10.00 and an underpayment of \$2.07, making a net amount of \$7.93 due the Excise Tax Collector.

Bonds Payable

At the close of the fiscal year, \$11,000 in refunding bonds of 1936 remained outstanding. These bonds mature \$2,000 annually in 1946, 1947, 1948 and 1949, and \$3,000 in 1950.

Trust Funds

The three trust funds of the town were willed by the same party for specific purposes. Interest on the funds was credited during the year for the first time since 1943.

As far as could be ascertained, no expenditures have been made from the funds except for purposes specified.

General

Due to the condition of the records, it was necessary to analyze all receipts and warrants for the year in the Selectmen's ledger, and all receipts and checks drawn by the Treasurer.

The test check made of paid invoices and payrolls indicated they were proper charges.

The difference in the school account, as noted in our previous audit report, has not been corrected. Ac-

cording to the report of the Superintendent of Schools, the school balance was \$999.54 compared to our figure of \$1,123.38, or a difference of \$123.84, which amount is made up of previous years' credits not taken by the Superintendent, as follows:

FIRST: To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

SECOND: To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

THIRD: To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for Roads and Bridges for the year ensuing.

FOURTH: To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for winter roads for the year ensuing.

FIFTH: To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for State Road Patrol for the year ensuing.

SIXTH: To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for Support of Poor for the year ensuing.

SEVENTH: To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for Incidentals for the year ensuing and including town officers salaries.

EIGHTH: To see what sums of money the town will grant and raise for Free High School, Common Schools, Text Books and Supplies for the year ensuing.

NINTH: To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the Repair of School Buildings for the year ensuing.

TENTH: To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the Salary of Superintendent of Schools for the year ensuing.

ELEVENTH: To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for Public Health Nurse for the year ensuing.

TWELFTH: To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for State Tax for the year ensuing.

THIRTEENTH: To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for County Tax for the year ensuing.

FOURTEENTH: To see what sums of money the

town will grant and raise to retire two town bonds due in 1947 and for the semi-annual payment of interest on town bonds for the year ensuing.

FIFTEENTH: To see what sum the town will grant and raise for the Observance of Memorial Day for the year ensuing.

SIXTEENTH: To see what sum the town will grant and raise to pay interest on tax anticipation notes for the year ensuing.

SEVENTEENTH: To see if the town will vote to grant unto the Selectmen and Treasurer authority to borrow money on the credit of said town to pay current bills for the year ensuing.

EIGHTEENTH: To see if the town will vote to authorize the Collector to charge interest on unpaid taxes at the rate of one-half per cent per month on all taxes unpaid September 1, 1947, interest to commence October 1, 1947.

NINETEENTH: To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for "Bulldozer" work for the year ensuing, on unimproved roads.

TWENTIETH: To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the Maintenance of Third Class Roads for the year ensuing.

TWENTY-FIRST: To see whether or not the town will vote to enter into a contract with Central Maine Power Company for a term of ten years whereby in consideration of the furnishing of street lighting service to the town during the term of said contract, all as

more fully set forth in said contract, copy of which has been presented to this meeting, the town will pay for such street lighting service in accordance with the Company's municipal street lighting rate, contract basis.

TWENTY-SECOND: To see what action the town will take with the reference to authorizing the Selectmen to execute and deliver the contract referred to in the preceding article.

TWENTY-THIRD: To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the maintenance of the present street lighting service for the year ensuing.

TWENTY-FIFTH: To see if the town will vote to grant and raise a sum of money for the maintenance of the Waterboro Fire Department, and if so, how much.

TWENTY-SIXTH: To see if the town will vote to grant an increased compensation to the election officers and constables on duty at town and state elections.

TWENTY-SEVENTH: To see if the town will vote to grant the following salaries to town officers until further notice: Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor, \$300.00 annually; members of the School Committee, \$25.00 each annually; Treasurer and Collector, \$400.00 annually; Town Clerk, \$25.00 annually.

TWENTY-EIGHTH: To see if the town will grant and raise a sum of money for the improvement of Pearl Street at South Waterboro.

TWENTY-NINTH: To see if the town will grant and raise a sum of money for the repair of the roads in Johnson Park.

THIRTIETH: To see if the town will vote to grant a sum of money for the repair of the Heffernan Road, so-called.

THIRTY-FIRST: To see if the town will vote Yes or No on the question of building a section of State Road for the year ensuing, in addition to the sum regularly raised for the town roads, highways and bridges, and if the vote be "Yes", what sum the town will grant and raise for this purpose.

THIRTY-SECOND: To see if the town will authorize the Moderator to appoint a committee of five to examine into the feasibility of an addition to the present Waterboro High School building for the purpose of a gymnasium.


