This 167th annual report of the town officers shows that real effort has been made to carry out the wishes of the townspeople, as expressed at town meeting, efficiently and for the best interests of the people.

We regret having lost one of our number. Frank E. Clark resigned, effective last October 1.

The town's treasury balance is about \$2,000.00 more than a year ago in spite of the fact that over \$5,300.00 of last year's balance was transferred to this year's accounts.

Hurricanes Carol and Edna raised havoc in town and many of our roads were seriously damaged. This would have been a serious blow to the town's finances had not the State and Federal governments come to our rescue. We took full advantage of their aid programs.

At a special town meeting held shortly after the hurricanes, it was voted to authorize the selectmen to spend up to \$8,000.00 to repair the road damage. \$7,843.00 was spent and all but \$350.00 has been paid back to the town through the State and Federal emergency program. Resurfacing and tarring will be done next summer and the entire expenditure has been approved for repayment to the town. Through this program nearly \$2,000.00 was spent for culverts to replace stone culverts and to supplement culverts which have proven inadequate since the fire. This is as much as the town spent for culverts in the past three years.

We feel that the townspeople were especially fortunate in having a road commissioner who had equipment available so that repair work could be done immediately after the hurricanes and at considerably less cost than would have been necessary to get a dozer and loader from out of town. The damage was so wide-

spread that towns which did not have equipment could not get any for some time.

We feel that the town should be revalued by reliable appraisal engineers and actual value figures be used as tax values with a low tax rate. The present plan of using fractional values for tax purposes with a high tax rate is a hold over from the days when the State used the town's valuation figures as a basis for computing the state tax. This plan has not been used for many years, in fact the state figure on the Waterboro valuation is nearly twice the figure we are now using. With the present legal exemptions and the increasing number who will be eligible to take advantage of them it will be a considerable benefit to the taxpayers to have this job done. We feel that this should be done by outside people who have had ample experience in this work and who would not be influenced by local personalities.

We will continue to work for the best interests of the town's people during the coming year.

Your 1955 Dog License will be due and payable April 1, 1955. If unpaid by June 1st you will be notified by mail and an extra fee of 85¢ added, as permitted by law, then, if unpaid you may be summoned into court which will cost you several times the cost of the license.

Do not look for the Collector to call. This is a LICENSE, NOT A TAX, and it is up to you to see that it is paid.

See Revised Statutes, Chapter 5, as amended.

ROAD COMMISSIONER'S REPORT

This report is made so that you, as taxpayers of the Town of Waterboro, may better understand how your road money is being expended.

Contrary to reports that have been circulating around town, the money is not being thrown away. The town is not going bankrupt, and no money is being expended without first consulting the Selectmen.

I have set up a road program with the approval of the Selectmen, which, in ten years, will gravel and improve every road in town. In the last two years, we have built 2,600 feet of state aid road, graveled and improved five miles of town roads. This year a concrete bridge was built on Hamilton road to replace the wooden one which broke down.

All of the payrolls have to be approved by the Selectmen; the state aid road improvement payrolls have to be approved by both Selectmen and State Highway Department. The wage scales for men and equipment are set by the state; so there is no way, unless no work was done at all, that the funds could be misappropriated. If this were true, the Selectmen and State would not approve the payrolls.

I believe that the money should be kept in town as far as possible. If operators and equipment from out of town are hired, money paid goes out of town. Where I have my own equipment, and hire operators from town, the money is kept here in Waterboro.

As you all know, we had extensive damage to our

roads during hurricanes Carol and Edna. Here is a breakdown of the hurricane damage:

REPORT OF THE PUBLIC HEALTH NURSE

I herein submit a brief report of service rendered the Town of Waterboro by the York County Tuberculosis and Health Association for the period beginning January 1, 1954 to January 1, 1955.

The contribution of the Public Health Nurse in the school involves an understanding of the school's functions in promoting and safeguarding the health of the students and school personnel. She cooperates with the teachers, parents and physicians in scheduling examinations and treatments for the children with special needs, both medical and surgical and general health examinations. To help prevent and control disease. To appraise the health status of the students.

The School Health Program consists of inspection of every child in the grades. This covers the following and many others which I do not have space to list:

EYES—Vision defects. Poor eyesight will make brilliant children backward in school work. It affects their work, their health, and their success.

EARS—Hearing defects; equally as bad as vision defects.

TEETH—Temporary, permanent, condition of each tooth, condition of the gums. Good teeth are essential to Good Health. The child's teeth require unremitting effort on the part of the parents in order to maintain a healthy mouth. And herewith suggest an annual visit to the DENTIST, and a routine tooth brushing after each meal.

ORTHOPEDIC DEFECTS

DIETARY REQUIREMENTS

MALNUTRITION, symptoms

NERVOUS SYMPTOMS

GENERAL CONDITION—Recording and reporting all defects. Working with parents and physicians to obtain correction of all health defects.

WEIGHT AND HEIGHT taken, evaluated and recorded on health card.

IMMUNIZATIONS—Organizing clinics for protection against Whooping Cough, Diphtheria and Tetanus. Smallpox vaccinations.

TUBERCULOSIS PROGRAM—Tuberculin Patch testing. Case Finding. Chest x-ray clinics. Follow-up on all cases; visiting homes of active cases, suspects and contacts of all people of all ages. Assisting patients to Sanatoria. Reports and Records.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDING SCHOOL COMMITTEE

To the Parents, Taxpayers and Townspeople of
Waterboro, Maine:

Once again we are pleased to report to you that through your efforts and through the combined efforts of the teachers and others connected with your schools, that another well-rounded educational fiscal year has reached a most successful conclusion.

Before we go into this report in greater detail there is one point that we wish to bring out very clearly here and now to dispell any rumors to the contrary that are sometimes heard annually at this season of the year. Regarding tuition for Waterboro students to Sanford High School there will be absolutely no increase in tuition for the 1955 fiscal over the rate that was in effect for the last half of the 1954 fiscal school year, and it is anticipated that there will be absolutely no increase in this tuition for Waterboro students to Sanford High School for a number of years to follow, we have the promise of Sanford Superintendent of Schools, Neil V. Sullivan on this, and we were granted this permission to quote him as to saying. The arrangement which Waterboro and Sanford have is economically sound and mutually good for the lower cost per student basis for each town, and for more education for each tax dollar spent for the taxpayers of each town. In other words it is co-beneficial each town. (Attest:—Refer back to Article 1, Page 61. 1952-53 Town Report on the State Department of Education Inspection of Waterboro schools. "The community is to be commended for desiring better educa-

tional opportunities for its young people. The arrangement to consolidate with Sanford High School is educationally sound and financially practical."

Your committee this past year has worked very closely with Sanford Superintendent of Schools Neil V. Sullivan, Principal Lawrence Page, Guidance Director Charles Towle, the athletic coaches and with many of the teachers at Sanford High School. These officials are there to help you and your children in any problem which you or they may have pertaining to your children's education. We urge you all as parents to feel free to contact these school officials, you will always find them highly cooperative and understanding in any problem pertaining to your children's education, whether that problem be minor or major, it will always be given fair and proper consideration.

For the minority group who still persist in measuring high school education only in dollars and cents belief, after reading the questions, the suggestions, of what doubting individuals may do if still in disbelief, after reaching the questions, the suggestion, and our summarization of the facts as we find them.

1. Ever figure the cost to build a new local high school and the debt and repayment schedule to be incurred by the town if the necessary amount of money could be borrowed and not nearly enough money can be borrowed under any present existing plan?
2. Ever figure the cost of equipping a two or three course local high school today?
3. Ever figure the cost of staffing at least a three teacher (minimum) local high school today?

4. Ever figure the double cost of maintaining a two or three course local high school and still being legally bound to pay tuition for the large majority of Waterboro students who would still remain at Sanford High School today, or of being unable to hold a large number of students here whether the town were legally liable for tuition or not?

5. Ever investigate the standards to be met and the legal and financial obstacles to be overcome before re-establishment of a local high school would ever be acceptable to the Maine State Department of Education today?

Suggestion:—For those few doubters—suggest that they contact the State Department of Education at Augusta to obtain the hard cold facts of the matter.

Summarization:—Whether all of you like or dislike your Superintendent of Schools, the members of your School Committee or members of that group of parents and townspeople who stand solidly behind this program for better education of Waterboro children, the personal feeling is immaterial to the issue, but had you all seen as we have readily seen that although education cannot be measured intelligently in dollars and cents alone, that the Sanford-Waterboro arrangement cannot be matched by any plan submitted whatsoever, it is by far the most educationally sound and financially *practical for the Town of Waterboro* whether it is appealing or not to all concerned is side issue, an insignificant issue. Good education by and large costs money and though it may be a gradual process it is going to cost more money as time goes by due mainly to three factors.

1. Rapidly accelerated birth-rate followed by increased school enrollments.

2. Because sub-standard rural Maine teacher pay has rapidly been brought up to standard even though it is to be but at the minimum of rural Maine teacher pay standards. This has been done to hold teachers, to pay experienced teachers their rightful due amount an amount that present normal school graduates are now entitled to by law regardless of their qualifications, and to lessen the financial shock that the town would receive should for some unforeseen reason a large number of teacher positions have to filled by new teachers in any given year.

Because in the early post-war years Maine rural parents suddenly became awakened to the fact that in order for their children to have an equal chance with the children from other states in the nation that something drastic had to be done to correct the obstacles that placed Maine education at a very poor low national ranking, and which up until recent years had not allowed many children, especially many rural Maine children, a proper chance to receive a good education to enable them to take their rightful place in society. Thanks to the intelligence and cooperativeness of Waterboro people, they realized like people in many other Maine towns also realized that a serious problem was at hand and immediate and but mildly—opposed action was taken to correct the situation. Unfortunately some Maine towns remained dormant and some towns have been slower to react to their educational needs than have others, thus the still low national education ranking of the State of Maine in the total state by state education ranking but we in Waterboro with our teacher per grade system and with our high school arrangement with Sanford, stand high individually as a town over and above the low national ranking given to the state and it is reasonably safe to assume that our total Waterboro educational system

now ranks on an educational level with that as maintained by at least 50 per cent of the states within our nation (to attest to this statement one of the largest senior classes of Waterboro students in a great number of years will graduate from Sanford High School in June 1955 and it is reliably reported that approximately 75 per cent of these graduates will go on to college or to other educational institutions of advance study. National education statistics indicate that had this class remained in a two teacher, two course high school system that the drop-out or school mortality ratio would have been at least 50 per cent and approximately only 15 per cent of those graduating would have gone to college.)

Waterboro can be proud of their graduating students at Sanford High in June 1954. Out of a total graduating class numbering 135, two Waterboro young women distinguished themselves. Third high honors and sixth high honors went respectively to Miss Joyce Roberts and to Miss Gloria Fields, a fine tribute to both girls, to their parents and to their teachers in the Waterboro Grammar Schools. The other seven Waterboro members of this class, namely: Miss Alison Clapper, Miss Margaret Langill, Maxton Owen, Paul Prescott, Miss Virginia Swett, Everett Whitten, and William Earl, all did very excellently in their school work, most participating in many activities and also graduating on honor roll though not approaching the distinctive high honor position of Miss Joyce Roberts and Miss Gloria Fields. Of the nine graduates five have gone on to additional education, Miss Roberts, Miss Langill, and Paul Prescott are now attending Gorham State Teachers College; Miss Swett is attending Mansfield School of Beauty Culture in Boston, and William Earl is attending a business college in Boston, a fine record for a fine class, and a better than 50 per cent

average of the class seeking additional education. Like your predecessors, the 1953 class set a high mark for you to aim for, you the 1954 class in turn have set a high mark for the 1955 class to aim for, and from all reports the current graduating class is setting another high mark for the graduating class of 1956 to aim for high mark for the graduating class of 1956 to aim for.

An ever-increasing number of Waterboro students are earning their places on the Sanford High School Honor Roll, and with each enrolling class more and more Waterboro students are becoming activated in the band, glee club, athletic teams and in all other school and extra-school activities connected with well-rounded education.

Miss Gloria Fields and Miss Deborah Bean have been outstanding performers on outstanding Sanford High School girls' basketball teams, Miss Bean carrying on very capably this year where graduate Miss Fields left off last year. David Smith, Philip Fields, and George Abbott and several other Waterboro boys have given more than a good account of themselves on the boys' athletic teams, as also has Andrew Woodsome, Jr., on the freshman basketball team.

With no reflection intended to other members of the 1955 graduating class, Miss Constance Swett, Miss Frances Thompson, Miss Marilyn Boutwell, Gordon Carpenter and Philip Fields should be specially commended for the fine academic record which they have accomplished in their school work.

Too much of this report may have already been centralized on the high school situation but where the Waterboro grammar and grade schools are localized and where you Waterboro people are closer to this

local situation than you are to the high school education we felt that it might possibly be best to summarize it in greater detail, especially where much of your Waterboro grammar and grade school news is published weekly in the Waterboro news column in the Sanford Tribune. Thus we felt you had been posted more thoroughly on the school program at the local level.

Your local grammar and grade schools are now very well organized on the teacher per grade system with an excellent teaching staff in charge: Grade 1, Mrs. Esther Abbott; Grade 2, Miss Edna Roberts; Grade III, Mrs. Natalie Hobbs; Grade IV, Miss Maude Carpenter; Grade 5, Mrs. Helen Carpenter; Grade 6, Mrs. Jean Walker; Grade 7, Mrs. Florentine Roberts; Grade 8, Mrs. Bernice Fields (principal); music teacher, Mrs. Helen Snow Cropper.

Mrs. Nellie Sawyer, school nurse, has done a very commendable job in the performance of her work here in Waterboro.

Open house or parents' night was held in November (this year without pupils in attendance) in keeping with National Education Week. As usual this was well attended, however it was rather noticeable that parents of children in the upper classes did not attend as well as did the parents of those in the lower classes. This is meant as no criticism whatsoever but it is suggested that all parents work more closely with the teachers of their children, the results by so doing should turn out for the better for teachers, parents and children alike.

A fine hot lunch program is being very capably administered by Mrs. Clare Abbott. An open house par-

ents' night was also held in conjunction with the Federal Hot School Lunch Program, unfortunately we have to report that but very few parents turned out to see this important good health program in operation and it was rather disappointing for those women in charge in view of the excellent job and service which they had performed. It is also suggested here that all parents show a greater interest and support for this worthy program in the future.

Waterboro grammar school basketball teams are playing in the Sanford Elementary School Basketball League, with not many victories to show but with a record of good sportsmanship.

The annual prize speaking contest was held at the grange hall—was well attended—and all contestants gave very excellently presented orations.

Robert Carll won both the local and district spelling contests last spring and went on to the York County final contest at Berwick before being finally out-spelled after a long contest for final elimination.

Last spring a very excellently arranged operetta was conducted at the grange hall by Mrs. Cropper and her pupils. This operetta was presented to an overflowing crowd of enthusiastic parents and a great deal of credit should go to Mrs. Cropper and to her pupils for the hard work that went into this effort and for exceptionally fine performance given. This was by far a better operetta given by grade school pupils than one would normally see presented by students of high school age. With the installation of Mrs. Cropper as music teacher two years ago it is becoming increasingly apparent from the marked musical improvement of all children in the short period of time, that though the

talent was always here in Waterboro, lack of time devoted and lack of proper instruction failed to bring this most important function into its rightful place in our schools until the advent of Mrs. Cropper; little do we all in Waterboro fully appreciate the outstanding job that this woman is doing for our children—we are indeed exceptionally fortunate in having her services.

The traditional eighth grade graduation was held in June at the Blaisdell Memorial Church with all parts presented well by the class members. Here again as always in recent years the floral decorations were wonderful and the musical arrangements were excellently conducted in a very fitting tribute to another fine graduating class.

To mention but little on the repairs account we will brief it that this past year most of you are now aware that your school water flowage is now plentiful and that the water quality is excellent by the installation of the new driven well. In this coming year minor corrections are going to be necessary at the East Waterboro School to greatly increase the heat efficiency of that building, aside from that repairs should be of a routine nature.

There are some things and some individuals that we possibly have unintentionally overlooked in this report, if so please excuse us for our oversight, for it is not our intention to slight anyone and it was impossible to completely summarize everything occurring during this past school year.

In closing may we take the liberty of saying that if you, as townspeople and parents are as strongly desirous of better education for Waterboro children as

you were at the time of the change-over, and in all fairness to yourselves, to your children, and to your school committee, you should form a strong PTA or parents club to back up the efforts of your school committee. A meak or poorly organized and poorly operated PTA or parents club is worse than none at all, but a strong PTA or parents club, one that will draw out leadership and be firm and positive in their actions, and work with the teachers with the superintendent, and with the school committee—will go a long way in keeping the educational progress of Waterboro children going forward.

The support which Waterboro people have shown for their schools, especially at town meeting time is excellent and appreciated, but this committee or no future school committee can do fully the job expected indefinitely year in and year out without properly organized year around support of their efforts.

The school board wishes to take this opportunity to thank Joe Roberts for his labors in obtaining money through advertising in the last two town reports to purchase playground equipment for the schools.

His interest in behalf of the recreational program of the young people is greatly appreciated and the school board hopes that more young people will continue their interest in our schools.

These schools are yours for your children's education; they are not ours you merely trust their administration to us. Many of you must come forward rather than take the, "Let George do it for me attitude," for by such an attitude you are only letting your own children down. We give you this challenge, the answer is squarely up to you. We and any future committee

should stand ready and willing to attempt to do our duty to the best of our ability—are you ready to do yours?

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Members of the Superintending School Committee,
Citizens of Waterboro,

I am happy to submit for your attention the report of schools for the year 1954-1955:

Present enrollment of elementary pupils is 189, an increase of 16 over last year. Five of this number come from Lyman. Pupils are graded as follows: Grade 1, 29; Grade 2, 26; Grade 3, 23; Grade 4, 15; Grade 5, 18; Grade 6, 24; Grade 7, 25; Grade 8, 19.

Forty-three secondary pupils attend high school and academies in neighboring towns. There are currently 41 in Sanford High School; 1 in Limerick High School; 1 in Fryeburg Academy.

Last fall an extra teacher was added to the teaching staff, making eight in all. This made possible the efficient arrangement of a teacher to each of the eight elementary grades.

Owing to the serious teacher shortage the new position opened with a substitute teacher, Miss Bernice Stimpson of Limerick who served until the Thanksgiving recess. Mrs. Jean M. Walker of Alfred was elected to complete the school year.

We continue to hear good reports concerning the Waterboro pupils who attend Sanford High School. We are told by Sanford school officials that the record of these pupils prove them to be a credit to Sanford High.

The Town of Waterboro is to be commended for its school board whose members have worked so tirelessly and conscientiously for the betterment of its school system. It is to be commended also for its citizens who have generously cooperated. The advantages now being offered the young people of Waterboro have meant additional expense, but it is not true that few really worthwhile things can be had without paying the price.

The lunch program carries on efficiently and is well supported. Last summer, with money appropriated by the town, we purchased a new Philco deep freeze. This is a very definite convenience. Formerly it was necessary to keep certain foods at the Sanford Food Locker and to get them from there as needed.

Under the direction of Mrs. Helen S. Cropper as supervisor, music continues to be carried on with very satisfactory results.

Necessary repairs and improvements have been made where necessary, including work on the roof of the South Waterboro building and repairs to the chimney. One major project completed which took care of a serious need was the drilling of a well at South Waterboro. This affords not only an adequate supply of water, but water that meets the necessary test for drinking purposes.

At East Waterboro panic locks were installed on the doors to meet requirements of the State Insurance Commission. This winter we have had difficulty in heating the East Waterboro building and we have been advised by experts that the building should be insulated and certain changes made in the heating system. This matter will be taken care of in the near future.

In closing I wish to express my gratitude to you all for your cooperation during the year.

WARRANT

in the County of York and State of Maine

GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby commanded to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Waterboro, qualified to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town House in said town on Monday, March 14, 1955, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles, to wit:

Article 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Article 2. To see if the town will vote to accept the reports of the several town officers, for the year ending February 1, 1955.

Article 3. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

Article 4. To see if the town will vote to have a revaluation of the town by reliable appraisal engineers and to see what sum of money will be appropriated and raised for the same.

Finance Committee recommends that, this article ought to pass, (YES). That it be voted on by ballot. If it does pass by ballot "YES," That \$2,500.00 be raised by appropriation this year, and the Town be bonded to pay the balance, and that the bonds be paid in three equal yearly payments, in the years 1956, 1957 and 1958.

Article 5 To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for roads and bridges for the year ensuing.

Finance Committee recommends \$4,000.00.

Article 6. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for winter roads for the year ensuing, and to see if the town will vote to transfer the balance of \$1,610.46 from the 1954-55 winter roads account to the winter roads account for 1955-56.

Finance Committee recommends \$3,000.00 be taken from excise taxes.

Article 7. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the support of charities for the year ensuing.

Finance Committee recommends \$2,000.00.

Article 8. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for incidentals for the year ensuing.

Finance Committee recommends \$2,000.00.

Article 9. To see if the town will grant and raise the sum of \$2,420 to pay town officers' salaries for the year ensuing, or take any action relative thereto.

Finance Committee recommends \$2,420.00.

Article 10. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for Free High School, Common Schools, Text Books and Supplies for the year ensuing, including Superintendent's Salary and Insurance.

Finance Committee recommends \$33,000.00.

Article 11. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for repairs and improvement for school buildings for the year ensuing.

Finance Committee recommends \$2,500.00 and that the balance of \$397.00 from the 1954-55 account be transferred to the 1955-56 account.

Article 12. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for conveyance of high school students to Sanford High School for the year ensuing.

Finance Committee recommends \$4,700.00.

Article 13. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for a health nurse for the year ensuing.

Finance Committee recommends \$600.00.

Article 14. To see if the town will grant and raise a sum of money to be used in conjunction with Red Cross funds for the maintenance of a dental clinic for school children, and if so, how much.

Finance Committee recommends \$100.00.

Article 15. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for County tax, for the year ensuing.

Finance Committee recommends a sum sufficient.

Article 16. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for maintenance of a town dump for the year ensuing.

Finance Committee recommends \$500.00.

Article 17. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the observance of Memorial Day 1955.

Finance Committee recommends \$100.00.

Article 18. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise the sum of \$1,200.00 to be used with State Aid road funds.

Finance Committee recommends \$1,200.00.

Article 19. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for street lights for the year ensuing.

Finance Committee recommends \$1,560.00.

Article 20. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to borrow money on the credit of the town to pay current bills.

Finance Committee recommends that authority be granted.

Article 21. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the aid of the Waterboro Fire Department for the year ensuing.

Finance Committee recommends \$3,200.00.

Article 22. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for main pond roads in Bradbury Park, so-called, on the east side of Ossipee Lake and

Johnson's Park, so-called, of the west side of Ossipee Lake, and Hanscom's Park, so-called, of the north side of Ossipee Lake.

Finance Committee recommends \$1,000.00 to be taken from excise taxes.

Article 23. To see if the town will vote to pay the collector of taxes $1\frac{1}{2}\%$ of all taxes collected.

Finance Committee recommends ought to pass and that a sum sufficient be raised.

Article 24. To see if the town will vote that the Collector of Taxes charge interest on taxes unpaid on February 1, 1956, interest to start on September 1, 1955, at the rate of $\frac{1}{2}\%$ per month.

Finance Committee recommends passage of the article.

Article 25. To see if the town will grant to the Selectmen authority to convey by quit claim deeds any real estate to which the town has gained title through tax liens and to sell any other property which the town has acquired through nonpayment of taxes.

Finance Committee recommends authority be granted.

Article 26. To see if the town will vote to transfer the balance of \$1,240.00 from the 1954-55 Carpenter road account to a similar account for 1955-56.

Finance Committee recommends transfer be granted.

Article 27. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise \$500 and transfer the balance of \$215.60 from the

1954-55 account to be used for gravel in conjunction with Town Road Improvement funds.

Finance Committee recommends Transfer of balance and \$500.00 be taken from excise taxes.

Article 28. To see if the town will vote to accept the right of way leading from Pearl Street to the property of John Nason and a strip on the west side of the Nason property to the property of Melville Ricker, for a street, if given title to the same. On petition of John Nason.

Finance Committee recommends not to accept.

Article 29. To see if the town will vote to close the "Sand Crossing Road" so-called leading from State Aid Road No. 4 or Lindsay Road, so-called, to U. S. Route 202.

Finance Committee recommends road be closed.

Article 30. To see if the town will grant and raise an amount sufficient to widen the road on Pound Hill and Colby's Hill on the Ossipee Hill road, so a white line can be put in the middle and the school bus will have a chance to pass a car on the dip of this hill.

Finance Committee makes no recommendation.

Article 31. To see if the town will vote to transfer \$1,100.00 of the balance of the 1954-55 tar account (Article 36) to be used in conjunction with the 1955-56 Town Road Improvement funds to tar the Gould road, so-called, and transfer the remaining \$400.00 to the Roads and Bridges Account to tar the road from Route 202 to the residence of Robert Ramsell.

Finance Committee recommends ought to pass.

Article 32. To see if the town will vote to close any or all the following town roads:

- a) From the Webber place (formerly Furber or Nason place) to the Carpenter road, so-called, at North Waterboro.
- b) From Middle road (red school house, so-called) to the West road near Ross Croner.
- c) From the Middle road to Mark Hill place, so-called.
- d) From the West road near property of Sanborn heirs to the Middle road.
- e) From the West road near the residence of James O'Brien to the New road, so-called. (discontinued.)
- f) From the Buxton road, near Lone Pond to Lord's brick house, "Orchard Road," so-called.
- g) Williams road, so-called, from Kimball's camp by the dump to the Deering Ridge road.
- h) From the Williams road, so-called, to the Deering's Ridge road.
- i) From New Dam road to Chadbourne's Ridge road. Part of Old Portland road, so-called.
- j) From Ossipee Hill road near Louis Colby's residence to the road leading to the lookout tower.
- k) Ossipee Mountain road from "Swett's Lane," so-called, to the road leading from North Waterboro to the Red Schoolhouse, so-called.
- l) Allen road, so-called, from Ossipee Hill road near Gilbert Thompson's residence to the Middle road.
- m) Clark's Bridge road, so-called, from Happy Valley to the discontinued section near Clark's Bridge.

n) From Thyng's Mills, so-called, to Happy Valley, so-called.

o) from John Knight's road, so-called, to the John Woodsome place, so-called.

p) Oak street, so-called, from Chadbourne's Ridge road to the Webber road, so-called.

Finance Committee recommends closing these roads subject to agreements with abutters to grant right of way for fire lanes.

Article 33. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to petition the County Commissioners to close the following roads:

a) Nigger Hill road, so-called, from the McConkey property to the Alfred line, toward North Alfred.

b) John Carpenter road, so-called, from the residence of Thomas McConkey to the Alfred town line near Al Carpenter's place.

c) Stevens and West Buxton roads, so-called, from Chadbourne's Ridge road to the Hollis town line.

d) Thyng's Mills road from the Red Schoolhouse, so-called, to the Shapleigh town line.

Finance Committee recommends authority be granted subject to agreements as in Article 32.

Article 34. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise \$800.00 to tar Roberts Ridge Hill.

Finance Committee recommends \$800.00.

Article 35. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise \$350.00 for Civilian Defense.

Finance Committee recommends \$350.00.

Article 36. To see if the town will grant and raise \$50.00 for Maine Publicity Bureau.

Finance Committee recommends \$50.00 to be taken from excise taxes.

Article 37. To see if the town will grant and raise \$300.00 for right of way improvement on closed roads for fire lanes.

Article 38. To transact any other business that may lawfully come before said meeting.

The Selectmen hereby give public notice that for the purpose of correcting the check list of voters, they will be in session at the Town House, in said Town, on the 12th day of March 1955, from 2 o'clock until 4 o'clock P. M., and from 7 o'clock to 9 o'clock P. M.

The Selectmen give further notice that the polls for the election of Town Officers under Article 3 of this Warrant will be open fifteen minutes after the completion of business under all other Articles in the Warrant, and remain open until 7 o'clock of that day.
