State Road.

Our state road was built according to the specifications received from the state highway department which were as follows: We excavated the proper depth, built V drain 2 feet deep in centre 14 feet wide, 10 inches deep on outside. A long distance to haul stone made the greater part of the cost. We got the best gravel we could find within the shortest distance, paying B. C. Jordan 10 cts per load. We would recommend beginning where we left off and continuing toward Carles Corner. The cost for the next 500 feet will not be so much per foot.

School Report.

Report of Superintendent and Superintending School Committee.

The common schools of our town have progressed quite satisfactorily during the past year. As far as we have been able to learn, an exceptional degree of harmony has prevailed among parents, teachers and pupils. These conditions have tended to increase the effectiveness of the work of the teachers and to inspire the pupils with greater interest and thereby enabled them to make greater proficiency in their studies. With such elements existing in our schools, they are quite sure to be successful.

As an exception to the above mentioned prosperous conditions, I have to refer to the Gerry school. On account of difficulty in procuring a teacher for the spring term, we decided, agreeable to the parents of the district, to close the school and transport the scholars to the school on Chadbourne's Ridge. Transportation was furnished by Jason Brown and all went well for a week or more, when the oldest of the Gerry children broke his arm causing him to remain at home. As Mrs. Gerry was afraid to risk her smaller children so far away from home without the company and guidance of the older one, she kept them all at home the remainder of the term; and thus our schooling did not profit the Gerry family very much nor the district as a whole, as the Gerry children make up about three-

fourths of the number of scholars in the districts. But when it came to the fall term, we gave them fourteen weeks school in their own schoolhouse. This term was taught by Miss Edna Kimball a graduate of Waterboro High School (1908) who did good work and gave fine satisfaction to all concerned.

This experience in the Gerry district last spring calls to our attention the merits and demerits of our transportation practice, and, although this is no place to discuss them, we may well consider the propriety of taking small children so far away from home as is required in some cases, especially, when there are no older ones of the family attending the school who may be able to look after them.

The High school continued to improve in standing with Miss Blaisdell as principal. Good and creditable work was done by both teachers and pupils, and although the number in attendance did not get to be as large as formerly, very good interest was manifested throughout the year and four members were graduated at the close.

Mr. Ernest Lovell a graduate of Tufts College assumed the duties of principal of the school at the beginning of the fall term and under his tuition, the school has seemed to take on new life and character as seen in the general deportment and zeal in the work. We expect the school to gradually develop under Mr. Lovell, to a very much higher educational and ethical standard and thus become a school that we may look upon and refer to with just pride.

We would urge that our townspeople take pains to visit the High school and become acquainted with the work it is doing for the young people of the town, hoping that they will see it as a thing worth the effort and outlay that it takes to furnish it and thus seeing it, will do their best to sustain it. One thing that would tend to help along this development, and which I have alluded to in past reports, is a new High school building, which I hope will be realized in the near future. It gives us quite a little satisfaction to call your attention to the fact that three-fourths of our teachers in the common schools of the town during the last year, have been graduates of our Waterboro High School.

The schoolhouses at Waterboro Old Corner and So.

Waterboro, have both had two coats of white lead paint during the last year. These were painted by Erving Smith of South Waterboro. Mr. Chas. Rhodes, was engaged to paint other schoolhouses in upper part of town but has only painted the one at Waterboro Ctr. That this is getting along somewhat slowly in the painting of schoolhouses, we shall have to admit. It will become quite necessary that the rest of them shall be painted during next year, or at least during the next two years, if we have to go out of town for help.

The schools at Ossipee Hill, Chadbournes Ridge, Carpenter Dist., Middle Road and Gerry Dist., have too few scholars to be legally run except by a vote of the town, and in this connection, we would say, without discussing the matter of school consolidation, that now will be a good time to consider the policy of combining several of these smaller schools. In closing we might suggest one advantage to be derived from such a course and that would be an increase of the number of weeks school during the year, provided the same amount of money be raised for maintaining our schools.

As superintendent, I wish to thank my fellow-townspeople and especially their superintending school committee for the confidence placed in, the support given, and the indulgence shown me in connection with my work in their schools.
