



REPORT.

To the Superintending School Committee and to the Citizens of Waterboro:

Once again, we reach that period in the year which custom designates as the end of the school year, and again it becomes our duty, and pleasure as well, to present for your approval or rejection, a resume of the work performed and the results obtained during the school year just closing.

It is natural that we should view our work through "eyes that see no defects" and, therefore, we may be excused if we paint the picture with an occasional shade of great brilliancy. It may be that our enthusiasm for the cause of education has led us astray to the extent that we regard mere matters quite commonplace as grand achievements; if this be true, the judgment of our citizens is humbly requested that we may be set aright.

We have maintained during the present school year 32 weeks of common school, which we believe to be the greatest school year ever enjoyed by the pupils of Waterboro; we have paid but one teacher a wage as small as \$7.00, and this for but one term. All others have received wages varying from \$7.25 to \$10.75, and we make no secret of the fact that notwithstanding the maintenance of 32 weeks of common school, and the payment of a largely increased wage, we have to our credit in the treasury of the town a fund sufficient to maintain four more weeks of common school at the

same wages. The balance unexpended in this department, to be exact, is \$314.99.

Better teachers and better wages, a better school equipment and a better attendance, have been our principal objects during the four years just closed. We felt that were these objects even partially attained, we could confidently expect better results. If good words are a correct criterion, we have succeeded beyond our greatest expectations. The attendance, as will be seen by the honor roll, has greatly increased, and it is known of old that one of the accompaniments of the good school is good attendance. Particular attention is called to the number of honor pupils in District 5, and the large number in District 10 as well.

Last year, ten pupils, whose record for school attendance during the year was perfect, were presented by me with certain literary prizes for their efforts. Believing that the large increase in the average attendance might have been due in part to these little tokens, at the beginning of the present year I repeated the offer, and it will be noted that it will require more than the ten prizes offered to carry out my promise. I should feel no regret if the number was twice as large as it is to me a pleasure to assist in any way that will produce a better school attendance. Before we pass from this subject, I hope that I may be allowed to suggest to my fellow citizens that no greater nor more lasting results will ever be obtained for its money than it would receive from the appropriation of a small sum yearly for this one object.

For text books, we have been compelled to expend the usual amount but, with pleasure, we report an unexpended balance, as last year.

We have made the necessary minor repairs on our school buildings, purchased new stoves for Dispaid her a wage of \$10 per week, and she is worth much more than this amount to the district. The reason for her success may be summed up in one word, Fidelity, and there are many teachers who may profit greatly by a close study of her methods.

District 12. Myra B. Durgin has again been in charge during the entire year. This is our second school in numbers and requires a teacher of superior qualification to insure success. When a school continues a full year without one complaint being registered, we are content that the purposes for which it was created are being achieved. This is the record for 1912 and nothing more convincing of its worth can hardly be offered.

District 16. Edith V. Roberts, W. H. S., 1911, has conducted the school in this district during the year just closing. Though her experience was gained wholly in this district, she is rapidly becoming possessed of the qualifications that are necessary for the successful teacher. As a disciplinarian, she excels, and her methods of instruction are quite good.

GENERAL REMARKS.

The average attendance in Districts 4, 7, 8 and 16 has fallen below eight, the number required by Statute, and affirmative action is suggested on that article in the warrant which has to do with the maintenance of schools in the districts during the year if, in the judgment of the committee, such schools are warranted.

We have continued the transportation from Districts 4 to 5 and 12, and from 15 to 7 during the entire year. We have profited as a town by this method, and the increase of numbers in Districts 5 and 7 has increased their efficiency. The transportation problem is a difficult one with which to deal, but our success

in these instances prove that it is possible to carry such an idea into effect without causing an excess of ill-feeling.

WATERBORO HIGH SCHOOL.

It will excite no surprise when we repeat our former statement that the Waterboro High School continues to be an Approved school. Indeed we would regret a contrary report. During the year, the school has been visited twice by J. W. Taylor, the State High School Inspector and it is on his reports alone that the school receives its rating. Carl E. Kelley taught the Spring term and at its close six pupils were graduated. We endeavored in every way to secure Mr. Kelley's service for another year, but he was determined to attend college for another period, and, for this reason, we lost one of the best tecahers that entered the school. Geo. R. Dolloff, of Wiscasset, Maine, a threeyear student at Bates College, was employed to teach the Fall and Winter terms and has been quite successful. Hon. Payson Smith, State Superintendent of Schools, in a personal letter to your Superintendent, makes these observations in regard to the school: "The inspectory report for the Waterboro High School indicates satisfactory progress for the past year."

We make this observation for the benefit of the few kickers in town, a part of whom is unable to read or write. During the year just completed, the health of the pupils, in general has been excellent. The open winter, while an injury to business in this town, has been of great value to our pupils, as all could attend school with but little difficulty. The late closing of the schools because of their increased length has prevented me from ascertaining the average attendance during the year, but I am confident that there has been a remark-

able increase over that of last year. An increased attendance is surely worth striving for, a better paid teaching force is certainly within the lines of progress. These, and more, we have obtained, and for our four years of effort we are content. That we have succeeded in improving the standard of the schools is claimed by those to whom the subject is most vital, and for whose judgment all have respect. For the good will that has met us at every hand, we are, indeed, grateful. For the support and encouragement everywhere present, we can but return thanks.

The confidence of the Superintending School Committee, which four successive elections attests, the many acts of courtesy toward one another that has always characterized the meetings of the School Board, the general satisfaction that now appears to exist between teachers, parents, and pupils, have brought to me the greatest meed of pleasure; the assurance that there is bound to be a continuance of all of these elements for success compels me to believe that my successor may be able to obtain yet greater and better results—all of which is sure to inure to the great advantage of the cause of education in Waterboro and to the everlasting honor of the School Officials of this town.
