Superintendent's Report.

To the Waterboro School Committee.

Gentlemen:—It gives me pleasure to submit to you, this my first report of the conditions and needs of the Waterboro schools.

On the 17th of July, 1917, the Union District of Hollis and Waterboro was dissolved and a new Union formed with Limerick.

Your school system was in good condition and the accounts and records of my predecessor, Mr. West, were in excellent form.

In taking up the school work, your superintendent has tried to retain all the good things of the system and to supplement and improve in all ways known to him the methods and devices that promote school efficiency.

Special attention has been given to the fundamental processes of integers and fractions to secure speed and accuracy. Our work in English has been regraded and a graded list of Memory Gems added. An outline for teaching Hygiene and History has been given.

In all my work, I have received the unqualified and loyal support of my teachers and they have done their best to secure the finest results possible.

I feel that our schools are doing a fine grade of work despite the handicap of too many classes.

The parents and taxpayers have been most kind and considerate of the problems and conditions confronting a man in a new position.

Under the different items, I have stated as clearly as possible the needs of our schools.

Thanking each member of the Committee for uniform helpfulness, courtesy and support, I invite your careful attention to this report.

High School

Any arrangement, that does not take into consideration the most favorable extension of Secondary School privileges to every child eligible to receive them, is not desirable for a town to make.

In discussing the situation as it now presents itself, I desire to deal tairly and justly with all sections of the town.

Our Class "B" School has been attended by five pupils, the standard of work has been good and the interest excellent. Because of the small number attending, the "B Class" classification was continued this year.

I have visited the Alfred High School twice this year and found our pupils doing excellent work, only one failure being recorded of (52) fifty-two subjects pursued by the Waterboro pupils during the Fall term.

The following analysis of our Secondary School population may prove helpful to our citizens:

Waterboro High School	5 pupils.
Deering High School	1 pupil.
Alfred High School	13 pupils.

Total, 9 pupils.

East WaterboroGrade	8— 7	Grade 9 0
South WaterboroGrade	811	Grade 9—10
Old CornerGrade	8 4	Grade 9— 0

Total, 32 pupils.

Three of six school districts can most conveniently send their children to the school at Carll's Corner. For the next two years, we may expect nine pupils to enter this school.

On the same basis, South Waterboro, East Waterboro and Old Corner will have thirty-two to enter some Secondary School.

If the pupils living nearest the railroad pursue the same course as last year, they will in the next two years send thirty-two pupils to Alfred, in addition to ten pupils remaining after the graduation of the present Senior Class.

The following recommendation is made for your consideration: That the town vote to continue a "C" Class High School at Carll's Corner and pay the tuition of all qualified pupils attending other approved schools".

In doing this the town will avoid the mistake of leaving two groups of children 2.7 miles and 5 miles from the railroad; and on the other hand, by a change of classification the town assumes the payment of tuition bills.

I trust when the town meeting of 1919 is held that economic conditions will be restored to their normal basis and some permanent plan of adminstration formulated that shall secure the very best advantages for our children and merit the support of every fair-minded citizen.

It is well at this time to ask:—What do we need for a Secondary School? Are we, in a farming community, willing to do without Agriculture being taught? Shall our girls receive the advantages of a course in Household Arts now being practically taught in most of our larger schools?

Few two-teacher High Schools offer more than the English and Classical Courses. It is advocated by some of the best Secondary School men in this and other states that our smaller High Schools be gathered into larger units and better equipment and a stronger teaching force be secured.

At this time we need the very best thought and power of the strongest men of our town and I desire to suggest this plan of action:—That a committee of three be selected in this town meeting to act with the School

Committee and Superintendent of Schools as a joint committee. The duty of this committee shall be to formulate and present to the next town meeting a permanent plan for the satisfactory arrangement of our Secondary School conditions.

Teachers

Our town has on the whole an excellent corps of teachers.

A good teacher must have both scholarship and culture. One cannot teach what she does not know. One cannot teach well what she knows imperfectly. She must know much more than school subjects. Her purpose is to lead her children into an efficient life, hence she should have that degree of knowledge of life that will enable her to lead the way.

A genuine interest in the lives of the children is quite as essential as scholaship. The spirit of helpfulness is one of the characteristics of a superior teacher.

Some of our teachers have gained much in the school of experience and are doing a splendid work in our schools. I cannot lose an opportunity to express my appreciation of the many evidences of skillful teaching, tactful and courteous management of school problems, loyalty and good faith in their attitude toward school officials, that have come to my observation.

It has been and is the present policy to secure the services of local teachers whenever it can be done without impairing the efficiency of our schools. This year we have found it necessary to increase the salary of five of our most experienced teachers of our larger schools, one dollar per week.

I think that nearly all of our teachers should attend one of the summer schools conducted by the State in the different Normal Schools, for the benefit of teachers in towns like ours, for the purpose of instructing and inspiring all teachers who feel the need of coming into touch with our best educational forces.

Fuel

I do not need to state that the rapid advance of fuel prices due to scarcity of that commodity has greatly increased the cost of the maintenance of our public schools. The cost of fuel has advanced at least 50 per cent. in a single year.

This year we have taken all of the fuel in the sheds of the unoccupied schools in town. Next year the cost of fuel will be, I think, at least seventy-five dollars more than in 1917. I have engaged fuel for next year at the most favorable terms possible.

Conveyance

The subject of conveyance was discussed last year in the report of my predecessor, Mr. West, quite fully.

At present, we are conveying from the Carpenter, Poor Farm, and Chadbourne districts to North Waterboro; one pupil is conveyed from the Deering Ridge district to East Waterboro, two pupils from F. E. Thompson's to the Carll's Corner district and one month's conveyance was furnished a group of children from Knox's Mill.

I have taken up and investigated every call for conveyance with the able assistance of the School Committee. I am aware that the total sum expended may seem large, but I desire to have our taxpayers bear in mind that this is a part of a condition which requires only seven schools where once sixteen served the town and that your superintendent has tried to place within the reach of each child, his just right, the opportunity to secure an education regardless of residence or environment.

Text Books

The buying, distribution, and regulations for the preservation of text books is one that tests the judgement of school superintendents as keenly as any problem of school administration.

Our schools need text books of clear, concise, intelligent construction. The teaching exercises should be helpful to both teacher and pupil. The drill work should be of a simple type; enough being required to see the a thorough understanding of the fundamentals and a lood use of English.

Our texts are in good condition but we need more reading matter, more reference books on the teachers' desk and more school supplies.

In my opinion the usual appropriation of (\$300) three hundred dollars will be ample for next year.

Repairs

The repairs for the year have been carried on as far as possible along the lines suggested in the school report of 1917.

At East Waterboro the new furniture has been secured, a hard wood floor laid, the front end of the school room and entry ceiled and new black boards furnished. At North Waterboro new black boards have been installed.

I think the plan of placing at least one building a year in good condition in addition to incidental repairs is a good one and should be continued.

School Attendance

One of the best measures of the interest of parent, pupil and community in school work and the general efficiency of a school system is often found recorded on the pages of a teacher's attendance register.

The teachers and pupils have been urged to do all

in their power to render our school work of a high standard and stimulate pupils to attend school whenever possible.

The teachers have reported their attendance every month and at the end of the term.
