### REPORT.

To the Union District Committee of Union District Number Six: It gives me pleasure to present my first report as Superintendent of Schools.

After a number of years of consideration by different legislatures, the legislature of 1917 passed the law forming all the towns in the state into unions for the employment of Superintendents of Schools.

Under this law, to the original union of Limerick and Waterboro have been added Alfred and Lyman making a four town district of twenty-five schools.

The following table showing the valuation, town appropriation for common schools, rate of municipal taxation for the support of common schools will be of interest to all of our citizens.

The teachers and pupils of this Union District have given freely to help the different war activities and the lessons of patriotism, helpfulness and thrift taught will have a far reaching influence on the lives of all who have taken part in the great "Winning of War" program.

As a Union Committee, you have an opportunity to consider what can be done to secure mutual advantages for your towns in matters like the maintenance of high schools, the employment of a district physician or nurse

the employment of special teachers and the best way of following out the offers and suggestions of our very able State Educational Department.

Upon your interest, influence and good judgment much of the success and efficiency of our school system must depend.

It is your great privilege to lead the educational way at a time in the world's history when America is expected to exemplify the finest ideals of a well educated Democracy.

It is a well known fact to all interested in our public schools that never have teachers been so difficult to secure as in the year just past. The war swept our young men from the high school work into the service of our country and many female teachers dropped out of the work to take up war work, or because of the lure of better wages in factory or office,

Our district has felt the teacher shortage less than many. Of the twenty-eight teaching positions, nineteen are filled by resident and nine by non-resident teachers.

The wages of teachers have been advanced in many Maine towns from twenty-five to forty per cent this year. The average wages of the State is \$12.04, of York County \$12.68.

That our citizens may know the wage scale of this district as compared with two districts adjoining, I submit this table of average weekly wages paid the teachers of our elementary schools.

I wish to call the attention of our citizens to the report of the "Special Committee on High School", printed in this report.

#### TEACHERS.

Because of our local teachers, this town has suffered less from the teacher shortage than any town in our district. Of the eight teaching positions, seven are held by teachers of more than one year's experience in their positions. Our teachers have rendered true and efficient service at a time when such service was difficult to obtain at any price.

In justice to our teachers, our committee authorized me to arrange a new salary schedule making increases of from one to two dollars per week. This increase is, in our opinion, a just one, both from the standpoint of the teacher and the taxpayer

Two of our corps attended summer school and I hope at least two will enter Normal School next fall. It is our opinion that we should welcome our girls in training to our school work and that it should be of such a high standard as to require their constant employment.

### FUEL.

This year our fuel has cost more than in former years. I have found our town's people reasonable in their dealings with the town. The prices paid for fitted wood in the shed varying from \$7. to \$9.50 per cord. I am engaging our

wood for next year at the prevailing prices next September.

We have three teams conveying pupils to the North Waterboro school and one conveying to the Center Waterboro school, at a weekly cost of twenty-one dollars. At the beginning of the year, I found the school at East Waterboro crowded with seven grades of work. It has been thought best to convey seven pupils of the ninth grade to the South Waterboro Grammar school, consolidating this class with the ninth grade in that school. By so doing, our teaching force was not increased and the handicap on the work of thirty pupils was removed.

This arrangement will cease at the end of the spring term as these children will at that time become secondary school pupils.

Next year, on account of the falling off of the attendance of the Middle Road school, we may be compelled to convey a group from that district.

TEXT BOOKS AND SUPPLIES.

Supplies and text books have advanced steadily, many lines of paper being 100 per cent more than two years ago.

Our teachers have practiced rigid economy and used only the essential supplies. We have, however, kept our text book supply up to a good workable standard. We have purchased the Edson-Laing and Merrill Readers and such additional books as our work demanded.

In the above lists it will be found that Alfred ranks second, Waterboro fifth, Lyman ninth and Limerick tenth.

To the Waterboro School Committee, Gentlemen:

It gives me pleasure to submit this, my second report of the schools of Waterboro.

I have in my report to the Union Committee called attention to some common topics of school conditions and problems of school administration.

Every town has its own questions of a local nature that must be treated apart from the general ones.

#### ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS.

The schools of Waterboro are in a good condition, despite the sickness and enforced vacations of the fall term. One of the finest features of the years' work was the graduation of eighteen pupils from the ninth grade classes of the Middle Road, North Waterboro and South Waterboro schools last June. The program was one that reflected credit on pupils, teachers and the town itself. Our reading has steadily improved, the Aldine system giving fine results. We have added the Edson-Laing series as supplementary readers in the Primary grades and as basal readers in the Intermediate grades with the Merrill Readers and Classics for the upper grammar Grades.

From close observation, it was found that the Algebra taught last year helped the children in high school very much. This year, we are alternating Algebra with Arithmetic in all our ninth grades and plan to teach and drill the fundamental processes thoroughly before the pupil leaves the elementary school.

A few weeks ago the teachers of our schools were, given a complete equipment of material for teaching the Palmer Method of Penmanship. This method has been gaining in favor for the last ten years and I have no doubt that good results will follow the additional helps given.

#### HIGH SCHOOL

Our high school at Center Waterboro was suspended a number of weeks during the fall term because of the Influenza and the teacher shortage.

This school has a membership of ten pupils, five Junior and five Freshmen from No. Waterboro.

In accordance with my recommendation, the classification has been changed to a "C" class school.

#### TUITION PUPILS.

We have nineteen tuition pupils in the Alfred High School and two in Deering High School.

At the present time, those in the Alfred school are doing a fine grade of work and are a credit to the school and the town they represent.

The tuition has been raised from seven to twelve dollars a term, so our tuition bill today is \$756 00 per year.

At the present time, we have in the ninth grade at So Waterboro and the Old Corner schools, twenty pupils. It is very probable that next year we will pay the tuition of thirty-five pupils.

This is of itself a matter of congratulation, since it proves beyond a doubt the desire of pupils and parents for the best life preparation possible, and bears the truest testimony of the excellent work in the elementary schools and the general efficiency of our public schools.

Our geographies have been in use for a number of years and when new books are issued, as they will be in a year or two, it will be well to consider a change of text.

I think the usual appropriation of \$300. will be sufficient for next year.

#### REPAIRS.

This year we have pursued the plan of the two preceeding years of putting one building in good condition each year.

At North Waterboro, the condition warranted a new hardwood floor, ceiling, doors, two new windows, paint, paper, curtains, a new platform and a new closet.

At the Old Corner school, the woodshed was remodelled and new closets built, the entry has been enlarged, the room papered and painted and new step built.

At South Waterboro, new blackboards have been placed in the Grammar school room and the room papered and whitened. A platform connecting the closets with the building has been recently built. The high cost of material and labor, together with some unexpected calls for repairs that seemed necessary, has caused a large overdrawal of this appropriation.

Next year, we shall need new seats and a new floor at the Old Corner school. Based on the expenditures of last year, I wish to recommend \$300. for the Old Corner school and \$100. for general expenses.

#### COMMON SCHOOL NEEDS.

I wish to offer a word of explanation to our taxpayers regarding the need of an increased appropriation for Common Schools.

For a number of years, this town has raised \$1200 for Common Schools and for the two years just passed we have increased our salaries 25 per cent. and the expense of conveyance and fuel have advanced steadily. At the present time, our rate for the support of Common Schools is only two mills, the average rate for the State was three and two tenths mills. Next year the state rate will be higher.

At the state rate last year, on our present valuation our appropriation will be \$1940. We have asked for \$1800 with the idea that we can reduce the conveyance and fuel bills.

If our bills for conveyance, tuition, fuel and janitor service should be the same as last year, we will need as follows: SALARIES,

Should the cost of fuel and conveyance remain the same as last year, we will need \$2,000.

In closing, I wish to thank the teachers and pupils for their good work and kind words. I wish to thank the parents and citizens for the interest they have shown and the School Committee for the support and help you have given me in the past year.
