#### A PERSONAL WORD FROM THE TREASURER.

To the Citizens of Waterboro:

I reserved this page to tell you how I have endeavored to conduct your financial affairs during the year now at end. My report on the two previous pages will inform you how I obtained the money to pay town bills and, likewise, you may see how it has been expended.

I have complied with the law requiring quarterly reports to the Selectmen of the financial condition of the town. In order that others might know, I caused the reports to be published in the Waterboro News.

I prepared myself from the first to pay all bills when they were due and the aggravating waiting for money did not occur this year. I think this idea was appreciated by all.

All bills contracted during the year are paid, as also others that should have been paid in 1919.

I have received \$200. for my services in collecting and disbursing the largest assessment ever made in town. The entire cost of my stationery and postage was \$12.80, for which I have not asked reimbursement as I believe it to be an item that the office-holder should himself pay.

I purposely omit from my report the list of "assets" known as tax deeds and unpaid taxes, something that has been an annual feature since the days of Adam. The deeds are of no value. The town may be able to get some of these old taxes and it should move to do so, or abate them.

You will note, also, a new feature in my report,—that of a bank allowance for interest on our daily balance, and we have received \$23.27 fron this source.

I thank all taxpayers for their co-operation in collecting the largest tax ever, and I am especially grateful to George H. Smith, to whom I have exhibited all books and vouchers and who has gratuitously furnished his time and the use of his adding machine in assisting me in arriving at a correct conclusion.

# Superintendent's Report

MAYNARD E. WRIGHT, SUPERINTENDENT.

To the Superintending School Committee of Water-boro:

#### Gentlemen:

It is my pleasure to submit for your consideration my first annual report of the condition and needs of the schools of the town of Waterboro.

The school year which has just closed has been marked by steady progress and with one or two exceptions has been unbroken by the prevalence of disease or the scarcity of teachers. At the beginning of the fall term there was an epidemic of whooping cough at which time it was feared that it would be necessary to pospone the opening of some of the schools. The term opened, however, and although the attendance, in village especially, was low for the first few weeks, the handicap seems to have left no lasting effects upon the work which has been accomplished. In the matter of teacher supply the town has also been fortunate, a full corps of teachers having been maintained throughout the year. It is hoped these conditions may continue. Continual changes in the teaching staff of a community are a source of weakness and a definite hindrance to progress. Although we may hope for a gradual return to normal conditions there is still a very appreciable shortage of teachers throughout the country and we are as yet very far from the ideal situation in this respect.

Work of very good quality has been accomplished during the year. There is evidence of interest on the part of the pupils and the teachers have manifested a spirit of co-operation in an endeavor to perform their duties in a thorough and efficient manner. There have been no changes in the course of study pursued in the past few years with the ex-

ception of the definite requirement of physical education. A period in the program has been set aside for this important and too long neglected subject. The work consists of simple physical exercises and instruction in hygiene. A good beginning has been made in this work but there is still opportunity for improvement. May I suggest in this connection that the State in accordance with Chopter 73, Statutes of 1919, will pay not to exceed eight hundred dollars to an approved supervisor of physical education employed by a town or union of towns. The services of such a supervisor would certainly be a source of progress in any school system.

Generally speaking the schools are well up to standard and the work of the pupils will compare favorably with that accomplished in other parts of the state. The advantages offered by the town are highly to be commended and it is to be hoped that as time goes on educational opportunities will be even greater. In the elementary schools a longer school year is maintained than in some of the towns of the State. A definite step in advance would be the increase of our school year to thirty-six weeks which is generally recognized as the standard.

Many towns in the past few years have been reorganizing their school systems on an eight grade basis. I feel that in Waterboro by an increased concentration on the fundamentals and the possible elimination of certain minor essentials it would be advantageous to put the schools on the above mentioned basis. It is a fact not to be disregarded that under present economic conditions a year in one's life is of no trivial value. The very noticeable percentage of pupils who leave school at the completion of the grammar school course, if not before that time, is evidence of this fact. Every possible effort should be made to keep these pupils in school. Under an eight grade system there would be a saving of one year in the elementary course which might make it possible for those having this tendency to leave school to enter high school with the further possibility that they might be encouraged to complete the high

school course. I am confident that the eight year scheme of grading is feasible and believe that steps should be taken towards its adoption.

#### REPAIRS.

Generally speaking the school buildings throughout the town are in excellent state of general, repair. In most cases the interiors are attractive and the paint or varnish is in good condition. Several of our schools have modern adjustable seats and desks, the latest improvement in this respect being in the grammar school room at South Waterboro. This room is not yet fully equipped, however, owing to exhaustion of the repairs appropriation.

Physical conditions in the schools could be further improved by the installation of jacketed stoves and ventilators. Lighting conditions could also be bettered by the shifting and addition of windows to admit light only at the left side of the pupils. Some of the buildings will need exterior painting in the near future.

The building at South Waterboro offers a perplexing problem. At present there is a very overcrowded condition in the primary room. If the population in the village should increase to any great extent the only practical solution to this difficulty would be the erection of a new building. Such a building should be so planned as to avoid a future recurrence of the present undesirable situation. I would respectfully suggest that it should be built to accomodate a three teacher school. I would also suggest in this connection the possibility of consolidation of the South Waterboro and Old Corner schools. Under such an arrangement it would be possible, with the three teachers, to grade the schools more satisfactorily and to accomplish the work in a more efficient manner. I believe this to be a matter worthy of the careful consideration of every voter.

#### TEXT BOOKS.

There have been, during the past year, no radical changes in the matter of text books although there have been several useful additions to our equipment. Two or

three changes, however, are imperative and should be made during the coming year. The geographies in use are not of a date of publication suitable to present day needs. As they are, for the most part, in a worn and unusable condition they would either have to be supplemented by the purchase of new copies of the same series or displaced by the introduction of an up-to-date text. The same situation prevails in the case of arithmetics. I call these facts to the attention of the voters for consideration in connection with the text book appropriation for the ensuing year.

#### HIGH SCHOOL PUPILS.

Pupils who are taking advantage of tuition privileges are, for the most part, maintaining good standing in their work. Last fall owing to the scarcity of high school teachers and lack of sufficient money to employ such a teacher the high school at Waterboro Center was not opened. Tuition privileges have been offered the pupils in this part of the town, either at Limerick Academy or at Alfred. It is certainly the desire of the Committee that every boy and girl in Waterboro shall have the advantage of a high school education. It is hoped that in the near future this matter may have a satisfactory adjustment which will offer equitable opportunities to the pupils of the various sections of the town. Under present conditions no better arrangements could be made. For the sake of our pupils, who are really the ones to suffer, may we not look for a spirit of co-operation on the part of all the citizens of the community.

#### FINANCIAL.

Owing to increased costs of maintaining schools there has been a rather large overdraft in one or two of the accounts, especially that for the support of common schools. There is a small unexpended balance in the text book acaccount. We shall need, however, a substantial approprition for books for the coming year. I trust these facts will be borne in mind on town meeting day and that our needs will be met by adequate appropriations.

In conclusion I wish to express my thanks to the members of the Superintending School Committee, to the teachers and the citizens for their kindness co-operation and support during the past months.
