To Waterboro Folks:

Once again, I am privileged to explain to the citizens of Waterboro the ways and means through which I have conducted the town's financial affairs during the year now closed. It has been a hard year for the Collector because of poor business conditions, nevertheless the delinquents are few and the abatements are small in amount, Error in valuation was the reason for every abatement on property and in a few instances were called to the attention of the Assessors by myself.

You will again look in vain for the old "Stationery and postage" that frequently cost the town \$50., or more. It has cost me **\$15.20** for this item this year and I have had the largest assessment ever made to collect and over \$4,000 greater than last year, and I paid it myself.

You will also notice that I have secured for you \$38.15 for interest on deposits, something never heard of before my first year in office.

I have paid all bills promptly during the year and waiting for money due and needed has not occurred.

This office, as you will see, is handling the financial part of an approximate \$30,000.00 business. It is one of great responsibility, and will be greater the coming year because of the new school building.

If re-elected, I shall appreciate your confidence, if defeated, "it will be just the same," as Lincoln said.

I am again indebted to George H. Smith for the use of his adding machine and I thank all of our citizens for their co-operation.

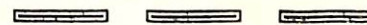

REPORT OF THE SUPT. OF SCHOOLS

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of the Town of Waterboro:

It is my pleasure to submit for your consideration my second annual report of the condition and needs of the schools of the Town of Waterboro.

The past year has been marked by progress and success. With one exception, we have been able to retain the same corps of teachers as in the preceding year, all of whom are experienced in their work and well qualified for their positions. Generally speaking the attendance has been good and the pupils have manifested a spirit of loyalty to teachers and an interest in their work.

Last fall the system was reorganized on an eight grade basis. The work thus far accomplished under this arrangement has been very satisfactory and will, when conditions are finally adjusted, prove to be a distinct advantage over the former method of grading. Under the present scheme more thorough work is expected in each grade and only those who have reached a satisfactory standard will be able to complete the work of the elementary course in eight years. Last June the eighth grade of the village school were permitted to take examinations for entrance to high school and passed in a very creditable manner. The results compared very favorably with those attained by ninth grade pupils and gave evidence of definite and thorough training in fundamentals.

A school year of thirty five weeks was maintained last year and it is desirable that this standard be continued in the future with the addition, if possible, of another week. The State Department of Education recommends thirty six weeks as one of the factors to be considered in the standardization of schools. Shall we not strive to adopt and maintain this basis in the near future?

Pupils who are taking advantage of high school tuition privileges in other towns have done good work during the past year.

SCHOOL BUILDINGS

The school houses are in good general state of repair. Last summer a new out-building was erected at East Waterboro in compliance with recent legislation relative to such buildings. The building mentioned was built in accordance with plans furnished by the State and affords decided improvement in the matter of physical condition. There is still one school house where work of this nature should be done, namely: at Waterboro Center. All towns must conform to the law in this matter not later than September first, nineteen hundred and twenty four. It is therefore advisable that action be taken during the coming year. Heating and ventilating conditions in all the buildings should also be made to conform to present day standards.

TEXT BOOKS AND SUPPLIES

During the past year we have made desirable additions to our equipment. The old geographies have been replaced by a modern and up to date text. Some of the old arithmetics have been supplanted by books more adapted to present day needs. New supplementary readers have been supplied where needed and the ordinary shortage of books through wear and tear has been overcome.

PROBLEMS OF THE COMING YEAR

The citizens of the town are to be congratulated for the action taken in the proposed erection of a new school building especially those who have so generously given their time and efforts in behalf of this movement. The new school-house should meet the needs of the town for many years to come, both for high and elementary school purposes. The building committee have made a very careful study of the situation and have shown excellent judgment in the matter of the selecting a plan. The building will have an excellent location and there will be opportunities for play ground purposes of which the town may be justly proud. For a more detailed account of the proposed building I would respectfully refer you to the report of the building committee.

The new building will be ready for occupancy next fall and we shall be faced by new problems of organiza-

tion and management. The opening of the high school will necessitate ample appropriations to insure the employment of trained and experienced teachers. At no time, probably, will it be more necessary to have stronger teachers than during the first year. The work of organizing and building up the school is a matter which should by no means be entrusted to those having no experience in teaching. It necessarily follows that in order to meet this requirement ample financial support must be given. Another factor to be considered in this respect is the adequate provision for text books and supplies.

It will also be necessary to increase the appropriation for common schools sufficiently to meet increased fuel and janitor expenses. In the matter of furnishings for the elementary rooms the town is fortunate in having a sufficient amount of furniture, recently bought, to equip the rooms which will be necessary for immediate use.

It has seemed important to mention these facts in order that there will be a proper understanding of the matter on town meeting day. The action taken by the voters of the town in the matter of giving proper support will, in a very large measure, determine the degree of success to be achieved during the ensuing year. May we not look for your co-operation in boosting the schools of Waterboro?

CONCLUSION

It is our desire to bring the schools more closely in touch with the community and to gain the co-operation of all parents and citizens. We feel that the schools have been too infrequently visited by those who should be interested in their welfare. May we not look for increased support on your part?

In conclusion I wish to express to the members of the committee, the teachers, and the citizens of the Town my appreciation of their helpfulness, loyalty, and support during the past year.

REPORT OF THE BUILDING COMMITTEE

We believe the citizens of the Town of Waterboro are entitled to know the condition of the school building proposition, after the splendid co-operation from all sections, at the special town meeting, for which we thank you.

The lot consisting of eleven acres (more or less) was deeded to the Town by the promoters of the High School. It is conceded to be the greatest asset toward the ultimate achievement of satisfactory environs.

The architect, Mr. Austin W. Pease, of Portland, has submitted plans of a modern and up-to-the minute structure. They meet the unqualified approval of the committee. The building is to be 75 feet long, 49 feet wide, two stories in height and have three entrances with a splendid basement, in which is situated the heating plant, toilets and gymnasium. On the first floor are three large class rooms, Superintendent's office, teachers' rooms and coat rooms; on the second floor are a fine large assembly hall, three class rooms and laboratory.

The cost of the building has been very carefully considered and the committee believes that the plan of construction will bring it within the appropriation. It is the general opinion of all parties that letting such a building out by contract to firms who think only of huge profits would be an unfair use of town funds, therefore the labor will be furnished by competent men whom the committee will enjoy. Throughout all deliberations relative to labor, the committee has had a thought for the taxpayers who must necessarily bear the burden of the present expenditures that their children may have a richer heritage. No person should seek employment there who is not willing to render an equivalent for the wage.

It was found impractical to attempt to complete the building for the present school year. This fact made it seem wise to begin construction of the building at such a time as would ensure its completion for the school year of 1922-1923. Building at this time gives a very substantial saving over what the cost would have been for the same structure last year. The framing timber and boards are already on the spot.

The committee for the exercises at the ground breaking have a fine program arranged, consisting of an

able address by a prominent speaker, music to be furnished by the school children—all schools co-operating—and other features. This event is scheduled for the earliest possible day when the ground can be worked. We take this opportunity to inform our constituency that their presence and their teams for service will be greatly appreciated. Many loyal citizens having expressed a wish to thus contribute toward such a worthy object.

With a spirit of confidence in, and loyalty to our entire townspeople, we go forward, believing that we are building for a bigger, better prosperity. The spirit of real service has inspired every impulse. Again we thank you.
