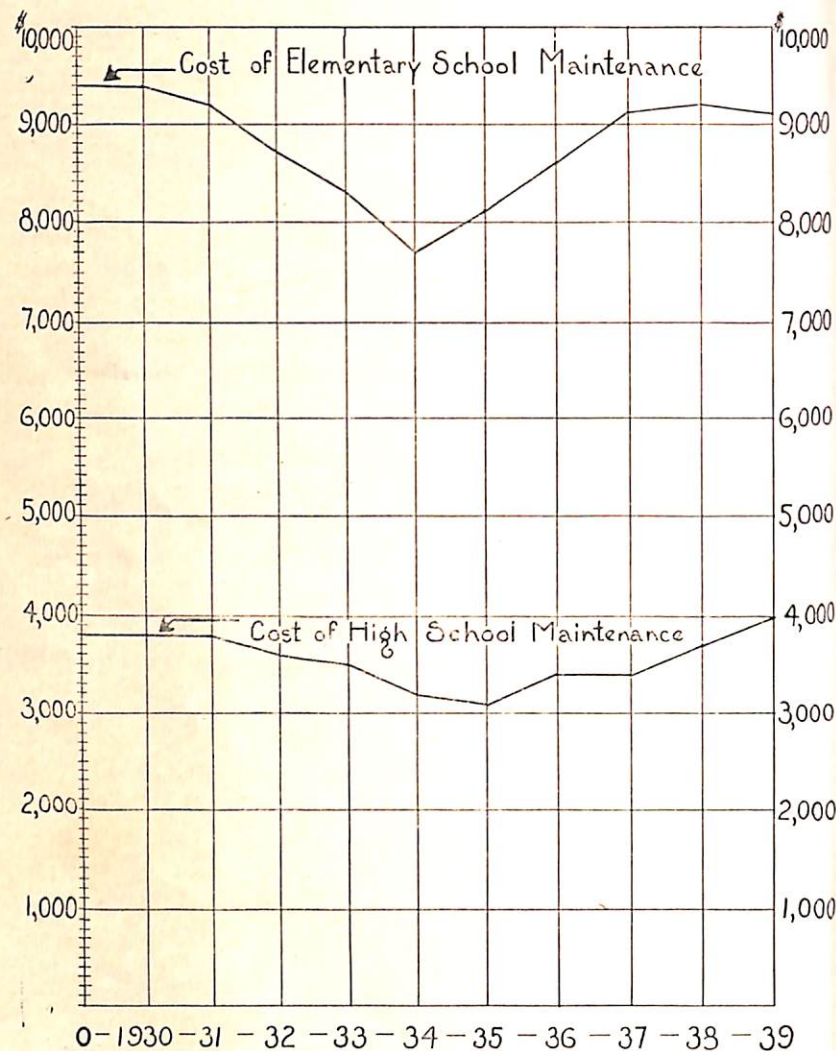

THE THIRTIES—A School Decade

For the information of parents and taxpayers the Committee presents a graph which shows the trend of school expenditures in Waterboro during the last ten years. The graph is self-explanatory and the footnote should prove of interest to all who may feel that the cost of school maintenance is too high.

It is perhaps most interesting to note that, in spite of persistent and successful efforts having as a goal a greater degree of centralization in our schools, the annual cost of school maintenance is today no greater than it was in 1920. In view of the definite measures which have been taken to improve our system, and to make it more progressive and responsive to the needs of our times, the Committee feels that Waterboro is to be congratulated that the per capita cost of education remains so low.

All who are acquainted with the financial standing of the town will agree that, with a bonded indebtedness well in excess of twenty thousand dollars and a tax rate of sixty-one mills, the teachers are treated as generously as that standing will permit. At present our grade teachers each receive \$18 per week; the high school principal and his assistant, \$1,600 and \$900, respectively, for a school year of thirty-six weeks.

In 1934 it was found that the number of pupils in the Old Corner School was too few to make possible its profitable maintenance and it was decided to transport the children to South Waterboro. This arrangement has proved to be very satisfactory since it has made available to the boys and girls of this district the facilities of a modern school building and has made it possible for them to enjoy to a much greater degree the benefits inherent in a grade school system, benefits which increase as the number of grades under the care of an individual teacher decreases.

In 1935 the building at North Waterboro was remodeled into a two-room schoolhouse in order to provide for an increased enrolment in that district. This school was maintained on a 100-acre site until June, 1939, but as an operation as a one-room school, the higher grades being transported to South Waterboro. With the present enrolment so small, the Committee purposes to continue this school until its profitable maintenance is no longer possible.

At a special town meeting held in October, 1933, it was voted to transport to South Waterboro all seventh and eighth grade pupils living in the northern, central and eastern sections of the town, thus making it possible to organize a Junior High School. This constructive decision on the part of the voters has made real progress possible, the six-year unified plan having proved beyond doubt to be the most progressive step made in Waterboro schools during the decade.

It was also voted in the October, 1933, meeting to make certain arrangements for the transportation of high school students living in the outlying districts. Provision for such conveyance at public expense corrects an injustice of long standing, best appreciated by the many parents who have in the past paid such bills out of their own pockets.

In 1933 a modern steam heating system was installed in the new building at East Waterboro. This replaced the original hot air installation which, over a period of years, has given much trouble. In view of the cost of this building (some \$6,500 in 1925) it is surprising as well as unfortunate that it lacks modern plumbing. The Committee hopes that it will soon be possible to install flush toilets and drinking fountains, thus providing facilities in keeping with the times.

Waterboro may well be proud of its educational plant in which it has an investment of some \$10,000, and all citizens should understand the desirability, not to say necessity, of providing annual appropriations for repairs, maintenance and insurance sufficient to care properly for this plant and guarantee its protection.

The high school building represents about \$30,000 of the total investment and the Committee was surprised to find upon investigation that this building was protected (?) by only \$12,000 insurance. This coverage has been increased to \$20,000, thus providing a more substantial offset to outstanding town bonds should the building burn.

The record of THE THIRTIES speaks for itself. In that record we find the clear imprint of the steps of progress. "The moving finger writes" the record of THE FORTIES even as we read. Let that record, in 1950, be a credit to Waterboro.

To the Citizens and to the Superintending School Committee:

I submit for your consideration the annual report of the schools of Waterboro.

There are 146 elementary pupils, registered and classified as follows:

Waterboro has 263 young people between the ages of 5 and 21. Of these 137 are boys and 126 are girls.

The present system of grading and classification has definitely increased the efficiency of the school work, and we feel that the past year has been a very profitable one. Although Waterboro has a school system which should be a source of pride, we should not be unmindful of further improvements which could be made.

Rapidly changing social and economic conditions cause us to consider very seriously whether or not education is keeping with the times. Statistics indicate that a very negligible percentage of our high school graduates are going on to higher institutions of learning. In spite of this fact, however, the tendency persists in many of the smaller systems to train pupils for college only.

It would seem that the time has arrived when serious thought should be given to that large percentage of our graduates who will not have the privilege of higher education. To the present curriculum should be added vocational courses, which would afford opportunity for some training to those whose future livelihood will depend largely upon their hands. In other words it should be the function of the school not only to instill knowledge, but also to develop those faculties which will best assist him in filling his place in the social scheme.

The problem of financing vocational courses is the chief difficulty which we face in making this change. It would be possible, however, by uniting with neighboring towns to employ a part time teacher. With partial reimbursement from the state and Federal governments, the cost would not be prohibitive. This suggestion is offered for your serious consideration.

Another change which would be of distinct benefit would be the introduction of music. Probably no other school activity is enjoyed by a greater number of pupils, or has a greater carry over value in later life.

Among improvements in the school plant during the past

year may be cited the enlargement of the stage in the high school assembly room, interior painting at North Waterboro, and a fence at that school, thus reducing the hazard of pupils running into the road while at play.

Although we have endeavored to remain within the appropriation in the maintenance of schools we were forced by increased conveyance costs over which we had no control to overdraw the account \$135.00. This fact should be kept in mind in considering the appropriation for the coming year.

May I, in conclusion, express to the Citizens, the Superintending School Committee, and the teachers of Waterboro my appreciation for the kindness and consideration shown me during the past year.

REPORT OF PUBLIC HEALTH NURSE

Waterboro

To the Citizens of the Town of Waterboro, I herewith submit my annual report as public health nurse for the year 1939.

In March, through the co-operation of the Farm Bureau, tuberculosis material was given Mrs. Ethelyn Roberts to distribute throughout the town for the Early Diagnosis Campaign held during the month of April. Mr. Sewell Drisko, principal of the High School was interviewed, and the High School pupils invited to enter the Maine Slogan Contest. The prize winner, later announced by the Maine Public Health Association, was Miss Jean Trecartin of Saco with her slogan "Tuberculosis is Master until Mastered".

In February, in conjunction with Mrs. Morse the State field nurse doing pre-school work, a schick test clinic was held at the South Waterboro School. Seventy-seven school children were given the test by Dr. Carl Richards of Alfred. A week later all schools were visited with Dr. Richards to read the tests and give the necessary re immunizations.

The school health inspections were completed in February in all schools. Two special inspections for evidence of skin disease were made at the South Waterboro school. Home visits were made on numerous children in need of corrections. One boy was taken to an oculist at Sanford for a vision examination. Glasses were provided him through the generosity of the Waterboro Branch, Red Cross. Arrangements were made for another child to have a tonsil and adenoid operation without charge.

One boy has left school to go to work. The average attendance has been 48.84.

In the past six years about 20% of our graduating classes have attended institutions of higher learning. Less than 7% have been boys. From these statistics it appears there is a great need for extensive vocational training especially for

boys. The time is drawing near, when because of increased enrollment, it will become necessary to increase our teaching staff, in order to comply with the state requirements. At that time, I would recommend installing an Agricultural Course for the following reasons:

1. Our farming section is especially adapted to orcharding and poultry raising.
2. The course includes a very extensive farm shop training in wood and metal work.

TREASURER'S STATEMENT

The foregoing report has been carefully prepared and it is believed to be correct and is respectfully submitted to the voters of Waterboro for their examination. It is, however, subject to audit by the State Auditor's Department of Maine.

The financial condition of the town is improved over last year and is the best for several years. Briefly, we owe on Town Bonds \$23,000.00. We have paid each year since re-financing \$2,000.00, and we have met our interest obligations twice each year and on the day they were due. We have paid

\$10,050.00 that was borrowed during the year 1939 to pay current bills and there are no bills 'carried over' for the purpose of making a nice financial showing. There is a tidy sum of \$1,210.79 in the Treasury and the State owes us \$21.00 for Porcupine Bounty paid to July 1, 1939. This must be carried until the next session of the Legislature, as no provision was made for such payment for the year ending July 1, 1939. All receipts and vouchers were submitted for payment to the State Auditor, August 10, 1939.

Another matter that will interest our citizens is that George Hubener, who was granted Soldier's Aid during the year is repaying the same and will refund the entire amount.

We may receive during the coming year another contribution on account of aid given Mary Thompson, the date of payment depending entirely upon the allowance of the final account in the estate of the late Ella Clark.

WARRANT

STATE OF MAINE

County of York, ss:

To FORREST LASKEY, a Constable of Waterboro, in the County of York and State of Maine:

You are hereby commanded to notify and warn the Inhabitants of Waterboro, Maine, qualified to vote according to law, to assemble at the Town House in said town on Monday, March 11th, 1940, at 10 o'clock, A. M., then and there to act on the following articles, to wit:

First: To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Second: To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

Third: To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for Roads and Bridges for the year ensuing.

Fourth: To see what sum the town will grant and raise for state aid road construction (in addition to the amount regularly raised) for the care of ways, highways and bridges under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of Section 3, Chapter 229, Public Laws of 1937.

Fifth: To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for winter roads.

Sixth: To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for State Road Patrol.

Seventh: To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the support of a Free High School, for the year ensuing, including transportation and money, already spent for same.

Eighth: To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the support of Common Schools for the year ensuing.

Ninth: To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for Text Books and Supplies for the year ensuing.

Tenth: To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the repair of school buildings for the year ensuing.

Eleventh: To see what sum the town will grant and raise of salary for the District Superintendent of the year ensuing.

Twelfth: To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise of Public Health Nurse for the year ensuing.

Thirteenth: To see what sum the town will grant and raise for the Support of Poor for the year ensuing.

Fourteenth: To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for Incidentals for the year ensuing.

Fifteenth: To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for State Tax for the year ensuing.

Sixteenth: To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for County Tax for the year ensuing.

Seventeenth: To see what sum the town will grant and raise for 50-50 Road Machine work for the year ensuing.

Eighteenth: To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for Principal and Interest on Town Bonds for year ensuing.

Nineteenth: To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for Observance of Memorial Day for the year ensuing.

Twentieth: To see what action the town will grant and raise for Interest on tax anticipation notes for the year ensuing.

Twenty-first: To see what action the town will take with reference to the town farm for the ensuing year.

Twenty-second: To see if the town will vote to grant unto the Selectmen and Treasurer authority to borrow money upon the credit of said town to pay current bills, now due or to become due during the fiscal year 1940, and to sign notes of said town for the repayment thereof prior to March 15, 1941.

Twenty-third: To see if the town will authorize the Collector of Taxes to charge interest at the rate of one-half per cent to month on all taxes unpaid October first, 1940, interest to begin September first, 1940.

Twenty-fourth: To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the cutting of bushes on Improved Roads for the year ensuing and what method the town will adopt for the same.

Twenty-fifth: To see what sum, if any, the town will grant and raise for the cutting of bushes on Unimproved roads for the year 1940 and to see what method the town will adopt for the same.

Twenty-sixth: To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the extermination of brown tail moths for the ensuing year.

Twenty-seventh: To see what sum the town will grant and raise for the maintenance of Third Class Roads for the year ensuing.

Twenty-eighth: To see if the town will vote that, for the privilege of controlling the gate in the Dam on the outlet of Little Ossipee Lake, known as the Chadbourne Mill Privilege, from June 1st to Labor Day of each of the years 1940, 1941, 1942, 1943 and 1944, the Selectmen be authorized to enter into and execute an agreement on behalf of the Inhabitants of the Town, with the Cumberland County Power & Light Company, whereby the Selectmen of the town are to have full control and management of the operation of the outlet gate in said Dam from June 1st until Labor Day for each of said years; and whereby the town is to pay to said Cumberland Power and Light Company for said privilege a sum of money annually equal to the sum of seventy-five dollars, plus any and all municipal taxes laid or assessed on said property for such year; and whereby the town is to construct of concrete or stone extensions to the wing walls of said Dam, and maintain the same, such extensions to be of proper width, height and length as to prevent any fill from the highway running over said extended wing walls of said Dam falling or sliding into the outlet of said Lake, or in any other way clogging said outlet; and whereby said Company is to repair and maintain the outlet gate in said Dam so that the leakage therefrom shall not be unreasonable, and that all moneys payable under this article shall be taken out of the Contingent, or Incidental, funds of said town.

Twenty-ninth: To see if the town will vote to grant and raise the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars for the improvement of the Ossipee Hill road from the residence of James Roberts to the residence of Mrs. Nellie Thompson, on petition of Gilbert B. Thompson and eleven others.

Thirtieth: To see if the town will grant and raise the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars for the permanent improvement of Pearl Street, in South Waterboro village, on petition of the residents of said Pearl street.

Thirty-first: To see if the town will grant and raise the sum of one hundred dollars for the improvement of the Benjamin P. Hamilton road, on petition of B. P. Hamilton and others.

Thirty-second: To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the improvement of the roads in Johnson Park, on petition of Lot-owners in said Johnson Park, said sum to be expended prior to June 15, 1940 under the direction of Frank B. Johnson.

Thirty-third: To see if the town will grant and raise a sum of money, and if so, how much, for the benefit of the Waterboro Fire Department.

Thirty-fourth: To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for a continuation of the present street-lighting system.

Thirty-fifth: To see what action the town will take upon the petitions and application of residents for additional street lights at the following places in Waterboro:

- (1) Two lights on Road from North Waterboro to residence of R. B. Carpenter, to wit: one at the junction of said road and road to Ross Corner and one near residence of R. B. Carpenter.
- (2) Two street lights on road Waterboro Center to Limington as follows: one near entrance to Coodey and Limington as follows: one near entrance to Goodey and Chadbourne camps and one at entrance to Connolly road.
- (3) Two street lights on state highway No. 5,—as fol-

lows: one near bridge at Waterboro Center and one on curve near residence of Sabra Merrill.

- (4) One near curve on Third-Class road near outlet of Ossipee Lake.
- (5) One street light near the residence of Frank Carll and at the entrance to Johnson Park.

Thirty-six: To see if the town will vote to bring suit against the town of Buxton for expenses in the Cressey case.

Thirty-seven: To see if the town will grant and raise the sum of fifty dollars for repair of the road leading from Chadbourne's Ridge road to summer residence of Annie Sinclair.

Thirty-eighth: To see if the town will grant and raise a sum sufficient to purchase and install a metal culvert at Webster bridge, so called, on R. B. Carpenter road.

Thirty-ninth: The Selectmen hereby give notice that the polls, for the election of all officers under Article Second, will be opened fifteen minutes after the conclusion of the transaction on business under all other articles in this Warrant and will remain open for the period of FOUR HOURS, when they will be closed.
