REPORT OF THE PUBLIC HEALTH NURSE

I herein submit a brief report of service rendered the Town of Waterboro by the York County Tuberculosis and Health Association for the period beginning January 1, 1952 to January 1, 1953.

The School Health Program is made up of the procedures that contribute to the understanding, maintenance and improvement of the health of the pupils and school personnel, including Health Services, Health Education and Healthful School Living.

School Health Services are the school procedures which are established to:

1. Appraise the health status of the pupils.
2. Counsel pupils, parents and other persons involved concerning appraisal findings.
3. Encourage the correction of remediable defects.
4. Help plan for health care.
5. Help prevent and control disease.
6. Assist in emergency care for the sick and injured.

Number of pupils with the following corrections during the year: Teeth, 62; Throat, 2; Vision, 5.

Twenty-five school children were transported to Saco, by Mr. M. E. Ricker, Mrs. Frank Bean and the nurse, to Dental Clinic; six sessions of one-half day each. The Dental Clinic was sponsored by the local Red Cross and the Town. This is an extremely worthwhile project and it is hoped that it can be continued throughout 1953.

Audiometer tests and Tuberculin Patch tests were given in each school.

Many home calls made regarding health problems of the school children, and follow-up on tuberculosis.

With many thanks to parents, teachers, town officers and Superintendent of Schools for their cooperation throughout the year.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDING SCHOOL COMMITTEE

With the close of the 1952 fiscal school year, we believe that the Waterboro school year will come to a most successful conclusion. Let us pause a moment and briefly reconstruct the changing history of events which have transpired here this past year.

In keeping with the State Department of Education, suggestions and recommendations, your Superintendent of Schools, your School Committee and the Townspeople of Waterboro, went on a crusade last spring in an endeavor to provide better education for all Waterboro children, realizing that Maine schools ranked very poorly nationally due to our vast rural population and antiquated school systems.

The Area High School—this was our crying need, with overcrowded conditions staring us squarely in the face, with acute teacher shortages just around the corner, and with our small high schools here and elsewhere fitting the actual needs of but a few of those who attended them, it was decided to try for the Area School which had worked so successfully in Northern Maine communities. We could not afford to borrow, build, or maintain what we needed alone. Waterboro had to change and change then. Meetings were held, several discussions took place, trips were made, every means was exhausted and every effort was expended, especially in the view of the hope that the area school might land Waterboro at its site. One by one surrounding towns fell out of the plan for various reasons and the climax to all hopes for the Area School came when one of the proposed towns north of here made it clear to us that they would be unable to

participate in this plan for five to ten years. With but one course left to follow, the possibility of sending the high school students to Sanford, this was carefully studied and soon put to a vote of the people. Alfred soon followed the same course which has proved to be the wiser move for both towns. In spite of all of the clamor for the Area School, this move which Alfred and Waterboro have chosen to take has proved to be far more economical than the Area School would have been and it also offers far greater educational opportunities than an Area School such as we might have had could ever hope to offer.

Our contention and the State Department of Education statistics have now been justified. There have been just two dropouts during the school period. Waterboro students as a whole are doing very well in Sanford, they are contended and are fitting into an educational program that has something to offer for them all, in one of the best high school systems, without question, in the State of Maine. Waterboro students are indeed fortunate in this respect.

Acting upon the recommendation of your School Committee, the townspeople voted the North Waterboro School closed to enable the East and South Waterboro School buildings to be utilized for the proper operation of the new teacher-per-grade system which was recommended, and has proved very satisfactory for teachers and pupils alike and has brought forth greatly improved educational results. Although proposed, the teacher-per-grade system was not carried out to the letter, for upon finding but ten pupils in grade seven, it was decided in a move to economize, that it might be wise for this year at least, to combine grades six and seven. It should be pointed out here, however, that in 1953, or in the very near future, with ever-increasing school enrollments, we shall have to

add another teacher, making the teacher-per-grade system complete.

Acting upon a petition of three local residents, as permitted by law, a complete inspection of the school system was conducted by the State Department of Education and a report submitted. This inspection was most welcome by your School Committee and the report highly concurred with the changes that had been made and also offered some very helpful suggestions for possible use in the future.

Many improvements have been made in the school buildings themselves, with new paint, new desks, new lighting fixtures, four floors refinished, new lunch tables and benches, and a badly needed cement job at East Waterboro. Hot lunches are being served at both schools under good management and these programs are operating very successfully.

Early in November, in keeping with National Educational Week, open house was held with a night session of school. Approximately 100 parents and townspeople visited the schools and had a first hand opportunity to visit and discuss problems with the teachers. From the reports received from both parents and teachers this was a most successful and beneficial move for all concerned. We recommend that this practice be carried out each year.

It should be pointed out here that although school costs are up due in part to the changed-over system, that with ever-increasing enrollment, and ever-increasing school costs in the way of salaries, supplies, repairs and transportation that, regardless of what type of school system we maintained that our cost would continue upward to a certain degree. We should also bear in mind that in a few years hence when the results from the new State School Subsidy law takes

full effect that our financial return from the State in the form of a refund will be far greater than it is today, thus helping us to defray our school costs.

For those few who have been mildly critical of the cost of our per-pupil Sanford High cost, it should be pointed out that on a breakdown of figures, that our cost per pupil for high school education showed but a slight increase over last year. The increased cost, to a certain degree, can be attributed to the high school program but not charged to the per-pupil high school cost. The changeover brought about by that program really reflects in an increased per-pupil cost of the grammar school children for such things as use of the same building formerly used by the high school, also fuel, janitor service, insurance, increased local transportation, etc.; in other words a transfer of fixed expenditures from high school cost to grammar school cost.

The prime objective of the changeover was:

1. Better education opportunity for all Waterboro children.
2. Achieving the first—with economy to the town also in mind.

Here again, we wish to emphasize most strongly that although the town is legally bound to pay high school tuition, we are also morally bound to pay high school transportation to Sanford, so that all Waterboro children of high school age may have a equal educational opportunity. By refusing to pay the trivial cost of transportation would be the setting up of class legislation allowing only the children of parents of moderate means to continue their education. This must not be. The object of the change was to keep more Waterboro children in school and to better educate them. It is the civic duty of the people of our town

of Waterboro to see that both tuition and transportation are provided for them, so that any child who wishes a decent high school education will not be deprived of that opportunity irrespective of that child's parents' financial ability to pay.

We submit below a few of the basic points brought out by the State Department of Education inspection of Waterboro schools.

1. The community is to be commended for desiring better educational opportunities for its young people. The arrangement to consolidate with Sanford High School is educationally sound and financially practical.
2. Waterboro children are well behaved, orderly, polite, and generally well dressed.
3. School lunch program good.
4. Should have more audio-visual educational materials.
5. Should be more grouping. Teacher-per-grade should improve this.
6. All teachers are earnest workers.
7. Evidence of good teaching.
8. More attention to slower students. Here again teacher-per-grade would improve this.
9. Strongly urge that sixth and seventh grades be provided with separate teachers as soon as convenient.
10. High school building very inadequate to house a modern high school program.
11. Building and safety precautions good.

12. Lighting, heating, ventilation, sanitation comply with most of modern school building standards.
13. Plans of the school officials to house the two lower grades in the East Waterboro building appear satisfactory for the present.
14. Need better supply of teaching materials other than text books.

It is a pleasure to render this somewhat lengthy report. It has been a pleasure working with you and for you. You, the people of Waterboro, should feel proud of the opportunity which you have provided for the educational advancement of your children. Education is like insurance, it is an investment for the future. There may have been a few more tax dollars spent, but your 1952 tax dollar bought a lot more education per child than has been provided for many years. We must not economize and stifle educational opportunity.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Members of the Superintending School Committee and
Citizens of Waterboro:

The annual report of schools is herewith submitted:

At a special town meeting held last spring it was voted to close the High School and to transport the pupils to Sanford High School. It was also voted to close the elementary school at North Waterboro. This made possible a very effective reorganization of grades and assignment of teachers. At the present time, with one exception, there is but one grade to a teacher. Mrs. Bertha W. Blodgett has Grade 1; Miss Edna E. Roberts, Grade 2. These two grades are housed at East Waterboro. Mrs. Natalie K. Hobbs has Grade 3; Miss Maude H. Carpenter, Grade 4; Mrs. Helen M. Carpenter, Grade 5; Mrs. Florentine T. Roberts, Grades 6 and 7; Mrs. Bernice K. Fields, Grade 8.

There are at the present time 160 elementary pupils graded as follows: Grade 1, 28; Grade 2, 19; Grade 3, 16; Grade 4, 27; Grade 5, 22; Grade 6, 18; Grade 7, 11; Grade 8, 19. A study of these figures shows that no teacher has more than 29 pupils. For a more detailed account of this program I refer you to the report submitted by the Superintending School Committee.

Major as well as minor repairs and improvements have been made on the school buildings during the year. At South Waterboro a fire escape was installed and major improvement of the heating system made. Heating facilities at East Waterboro have never been effective. The installation of an oil burner has remedied this condition.

The school lunch program has been carried on successfully both at South and East. Although we are operating on a very narrow margin we have not been obliged to increase the price of the lunch as has been the case in some towns of the state. It is the practice in some towns to appropriate money to help support this program and I am offering this information as a suggestion for consideration.

In closing may I express my sincere appreciation to the Citizens, the Superintending School Committee, and all teaching personnel for their cooperation during the year.

WARRANT

STATE OF MAINE

To Forest Laskey, a Constable of the Town of

GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby commanded to notify and warn the Inhabitants of said Waterboro, qualified to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town House in said town on Monday, March 9, 1953, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles, to wit:

Article 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Article 2. To choose all necessary town officers for said town for the year ensuing.

Article 3. To see what sum the town will grant and raise for Roads and Bridges for the year ensuing.

Finance Committee recommends \$3,000.00 and that this amount be taken from the 1953 Excise Taxes.

Article 4. To see what sum the town will grant and raise for Winter Roads for the year ensuing.

Finance Committee recommends \$300.00. This amount being in conjunction with Article 13.

Article 5. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for the Support of Charities for the year ensuing, the same being in lieu of former appropriations entitled: Support of Poor, and including monies to be paid for Old Age Assistance, Aid to Dependent Children, etc.

Finance Committee recommends \$1,500.00.

Article 6. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for Incidentals for the year ensuing.

Finance Committee recommends \$2,000.00

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to pay the Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor as per: Chairman \$500.00, other two members \$400.00, this being for the annual town year, or in accordance with R. S. 1944, Chapter 80, Sec. 13. that: "In the event a town fails to fix the compensation of the above said officers at its annual meeting, then such officers shall be paid on a per diem basis, and in such event, such officers shall be paid the sum of \$5.00 per every day actually and necessarily employed in the service of the town."

Finance Committee recommends to pass over.

Article 8. To see if the town will grant and raise the sum of \$1,550.00 to pay town officers' salaries for the year ensuing.

Finance Committee recommends \$1,550.00.

Article 9. To see what sums of money the town will grant and raise for Free High School, Common Schools and Text Books and Supplies for the year ensuing, including Superintendent salary.

Finance Committee recommends \$27,000.00 and that \$4,000.00 be transferred from Surplus Funds to apply on 1953 School Accounts.

Article 10. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for Repairs, Improvements and Insurance for School Buildings for the year ensuing.

Finance Committee recommends \$2,500.00.

Article 11. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for Conveyance of High School students to Sanford High School for the year ensuing.

Finance Committee recommends \$4,300.00.

Article 12. To see if the town will grant and raise a sum of money for a Public Health Nurse for the year ensuing.

Finance Committee recommends \$150.00.

Article 13. To see what sum the town will grant and raise for State Tax for the year ensuing, said sum, if granted, to be applied to the cost of Winter Roads for the year 1953-1954.

Finance Committee recommends \$5,774.02, same amount as 1952, and to be expended in conjunction with Article 4 of this warrant.

Article 14. To see what sum the town will grant and raise for County Tax for the year ensuing.

Finance Committee recommends sum sufficient.

Article 15. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise the sum of Two Hundred Dollars for the maintenance of a Town Dump for the year ensuing.

Finance Committee recommends \$200.00, also that the Selectmen and Road Commissioner find a new or more suitable place off the main road.

Article 16. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise a sum of money, and how much, for the observance of Memorial Day.

Finance Committee recommends \$50.00.

Article 17. To see if the town will grant and raise a sum of money for the construction of a section of State Aid Road for the year ensuing and, if so, how much.

Finance Committee recommends \$1,066.00.

Article 18. To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise for Street Lights for the year ensuing.

Finance Committee recommends \$1,100.00.

Article 19. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to borrow money on the credit of said town to pay current bills and in anticipation of taxes for the year ensuing.

Article 20. To see if the town will grant and raise a sum of money to aid the Waterboro Fire Department for the year ensuing and, if so, how much.

Finance Committee recommends \$3,000.00.

Article 21. To see if the town will grant and raise a sum of money for the benefit of the continuance of the Reforestation Program and, if so, how much.

Finance Committee makes no recommendation.

Article 22. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$400.00 to cooperate with the Maine Forest Service and the Federal Government in control of white pine blister rust, in accordance with Revised Statutes, Chap. 32, Sec. 54.

Finance Committee recommends \$400.00.

Article 23. To see if the town will grant and raise a sum of money to be used in conjunction with Red Cross funds, for the maintenance of a dental clinic for school children and, if so, how much.

Finance Committee recommends \$100.00 and that same be added to the school appropriations.

Article 24. To see what sum the town will vote to raise to properly maintain the Main Pond Roads beginning at Harold Hall's Garage on the road leading from Waterboro Center to West Buxton, and beginning at Donald Johnson's on Route No. 5 in through Johnson Park, on the west side of the lake. On petition of C. Millard Neal and twenty-one others.

Finance Committee recommends \$1 000.00.

Article 25. To see if the town will grant and raise the sum of Fifty Dollars to be paid to the Maine Publicity Bureau and used for advertising the natural resources, etc, for the State of Maine.

Finance Committee recommends \$50.00.

Article 26. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Collector of Taxes to charge interest on unpaid taxes on October 1, 1953, interest to commence September 1st, 1953, at the rate of one-half per cent per month.

Article 27. To see if the town will raise a sum of money sufficient to properly repair road, culvert and ditches on said road. Roading beginning at No. 202 by Forrest M. Abbott, Sr. and Elmer Woodard to residence of L. Donald Ford. On petition of L. Donald Ford and nine others.

Finance Committee recommends \$500.00.

Article 28. To see if the town will grant and raise a sum of money sufficient to ditch, properly repair and retarring of road from North Waterboro Square to residence of Austin B. Carpenter. On petition of Austin B. Carpenter and twelve others.

Finance Committee recommends \$1,000.00 and that same be taken from the 1953 Excise Taxes.

Article 29. To see if the town will vote to grant unto the Selectmen authority to convey by quit claim deeds any real estate in said town to which it has gained title through matured tax liens or other property of said inhabitants.

Article 30. To transact any other business that may lawfully come before said meeting.

The Selectmen hereby give public notice that for the purpose of correcting the check list of voters, they will be in session at the Town House, in said Town, on the sixth day of March, 1953, from 2 o'clock until 4 o'clock P. M. and from 7 o'clock to 9 o'clock P. M.
